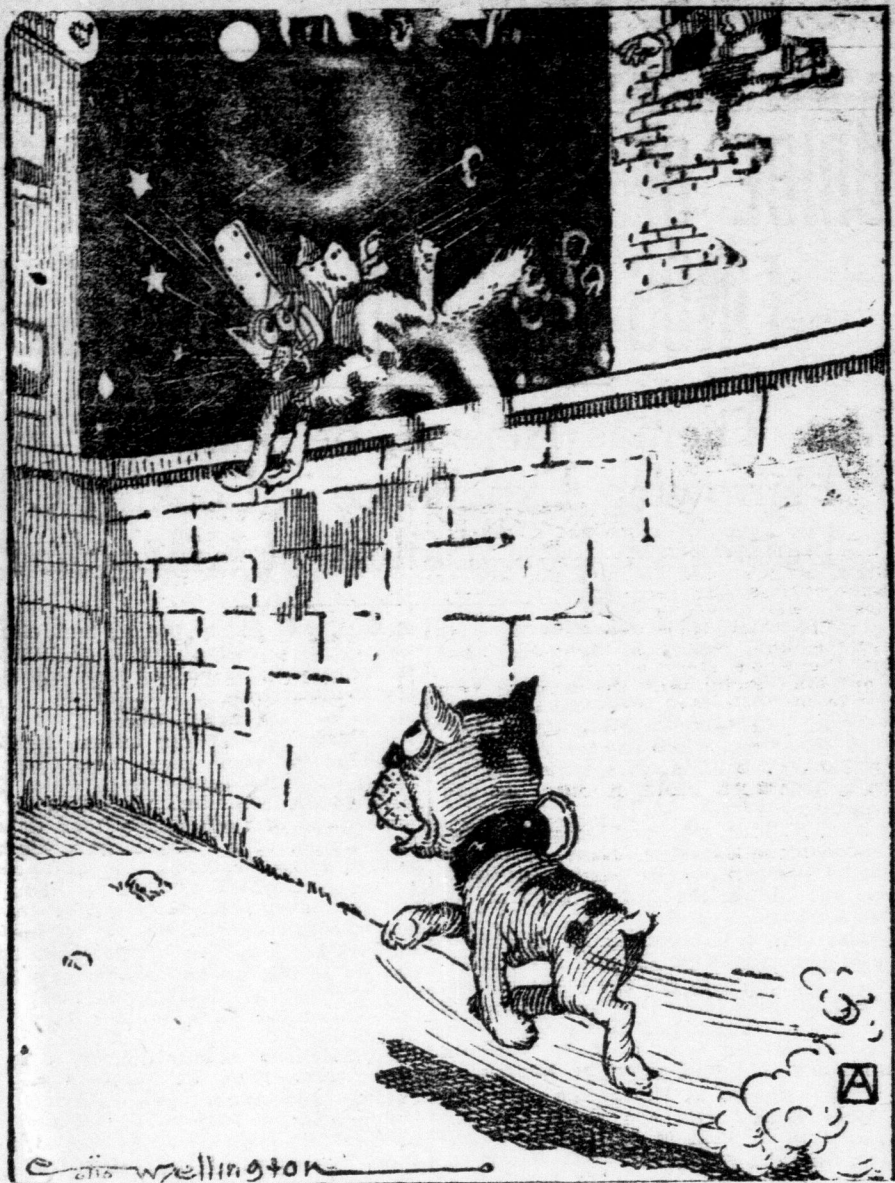

EXPOSED METHODS
OF WHITNEY GOVT.
IN DUPING PEOPLE

Mr. J. C. Elliott and Ex-Mayor
Urquhart Address Big Glan-
worth Meeting.

BANISH THE BAR POPULAR

Liquor Interests Have No Poli-
tics But Those Governing
the Trade.

[By Staff Reporter.]
Glanworth, Nov. 19.—Mr. Thomas
Urquhart, ex-Mayor of Toronto, and
Mr. J. C. Elliott, M. P. for West
Middlesex, received a rousing recep-
tion from the electors of Westminster
in the I. O. O. F. hall here tonight,
when they appeared in the interests of
the fusion candidate, Mr. John W.
Laidlaw.

Both speakers dwelt at some length
on the paramount issue of the cam-
paign, the abolition of the bar, but
they also spent some time in explain-
ing the methods that are being em-
ployed by the Conservative party to
draw the wool over the electors' eyes
and the abuses to which the Whitney

Government is subjecting the people
of this province.

A keen interest was taken by those
present in both addresses, and at the
close of the meeting three rousing
cheers were given for the King, Mr.
Newton W. Rowell and his policy, and
the candidate, Mr. John W. Laidlaw.

The enthusiasm of the farmers in
this district is evidenced by the
fact that they waited until 9:40 for
the speakers to appear, they being de-
tained in the city and on the road, and
also that not one man left the hall,
although the meeting lasted until
nearly midnight.

After the meeting both Mr. Urqu-
hart and Mr. Elliott remarked that
never before had they had such an ap-
preciative audience.

Mr. Robert Elliott was chosen chair-
man, and in a few brief remarks in-
troduced the subject of the abolition
of the bar, and the speakers of the
evening. He was tendered a vote of
thanks for his services, as were the
speakers.

In summing up, the chairman point-
ed out that although the voters of
Westminster had decided to abolish
the bar in that township, their duties
did not end there, and that it was up
to the electors to return Mr. Laidlaw
a victor, and to help the rest of On-
tario in its fight against the curse of
drink.

In opening his speech Mr. Urquhart
said that it was a great pleasure for
him to take part in the present con-
test. "It is so long since I took any
part in a political contest that I feel
kind of out of place," said he. "But
when this great and moral issue of the
abolition of the bar came up I felt
that it was my duty to come out
and give all the assistance I could."

"The Conservative party is trying to
draw a red herring across the trail,
and trying to make hydro-electric the
main issue in this contest," he contin-
ued. "Let me tell you, gentlemen, that
while I esteem Hon. Adam Beck, for
the stand he has taken and the work
he has done on the power commission,
it was the Liberal party which first
introduced the question of power for
the province, and it is the Liberal
party that should get the credit for it.

I admire Adam Beck very much. At
one time he had his back up against
the wall and was fighting for hydro-
electric; but who was it he was fight-
ing? Not the Liberals, but the mem-
bers of his own party, headed by the
Hon. J. P. Whitney. In a genuine
hydro-electric printed when there was
no talk of an election, we find that
the first step towards its consumma-
tion was taken in Toronto on the
25th of April, 1900, at the meeting of
Massey, a strong Liberal, was chair-
man of a committee at that time. Then
at a meeting of municipalities held
some time later Ald. F. S. Spence, also
a Liberal, was elected mayor of the
city. In 1902 a committee was
appointed to go into the question, and
one of the members was Ald. Spence.

On Feb. 17, 1903, a meeting was
held in Berlin. I was one of the
representatives, being elected mayor in
Toronto in January of the same year,
and I moved a resolution asking the
Government to take up the work of
providing the province with electric
energy."

They are saying today that if you
vote for Mr. Laidlaw you are voting
against Hon. Adam Beck and hydro-
electric, but such is not the case. The
Liberals were the first to get behind
hydro-electric, and they are behind it
today, and I hope, gentlemen, that
you will not allow an issue of that
sort to distract from the real issue,
the abolition of the bar. You have
in Mr. Laidlaw a tried and true
candidate for temperance, and it is
every man's duty to vote for him re-
gardless of politics.

Personally, I think the accommoda-
tion of the public is one of the finest
things a man could be interested in,
but why should the sale of liquor be
tied up with it?

In dealing with the abolition of the
bar we will just look at a few figures.
The drink bill of Canada last year
was \$1,000,000,000. That is, it amounts
to \$22,000,000. If any Government
would say we are going to spend that
much money in good roads or in liv-
ing the farmers cheap power the peo-
ple would stand against it; yet the peo-
ple of this province spend that amount
annually in poison, which they take
into their systems. Take the loss in
labor, in time, and in wages. Statis-
tics compiled in Great Britain and the
United States show that about 10 per
cent of time is lost through whiskey.

Well, we will not go that far in Cana-
da; we will take it on a 5 per cent
basis, and we find that it amounts to
\$68,000,000. Then take the loss of life.
We find that 5,000 people die annually
through the use of liquor. The Govern-
ment values an immigrant at some-
thing like \$1,000 each. Allow \$500 for
each person that dies from the use
of liquor, and what does it amount to?
Figure in also the costs of our hospi-
tals and jails, and then you will find
that the cost of the bar is enormous.

What are we going to do about it?
Are we going to stand aside and see
this great and awful waste? I do not
think so. I think the people of this
country are going to stand up and in
their wrath drive out this curse, and
save their boys. The great curse of
social life is this curse of whiskey.

Poverty, crime and a great deal of
sickness is caused by drink, and the
open bar is the cause of the drinking
habit.

"While a great many of the hotel-
keepers of the country are lawless,
men there are a number who are law-
less. The London Free Press of Sept.
17, tells of many Indians being drunk
during fair week, and of a man selling
liquor at fair grounds. If the law
had been kept this would not have
happened."

"What are the politics of the liquor
party? The trade itself is their poli-
tics. They have none but the carry-
ing of their trade. Have the Govern-
ment and Mr. Whitney allied them-
selves with the liquor party? I think
they have. Sir James Whitney has a
tremendous majority and could wipe
out the liquor system if he wanted to,
but he does not do it. The people
should see that the bar is put out of
politics, and the only way to do it is
to abolish the bar, and if necessary
to abolish the Government that sup-
ports it."

The people of Ontario have twice
voted on a plebiscite in favor of pro-
hibition, the last time in 1902, by a
majority of 96,000, but in spite of the

wish of the people that the liquor traf-
fic be abolished Sir James Whitney
has refused to do so.

In 1902 Mr. Rowell asked Sir James
to have both parties join hands and
wipe out this curse of the bar, but he
has not done so.

Mr. Urquhart then spoke on agri-
cultural questions, railway taxation
and several other questions and closed
by making an eloquent appeal for the
electors of Westminster to support Mr.
Laidlaw on the 27th of November. His
speech was greeted by prolonged ap-
plause and many cheers.

Mr. J. C. Elliott.
In opening his speech Mr. J. C. El-
liott complimented the electors for
the fine turnout on such a night, and
their perseverance in waiting so long
for the speakers to appear.

He dealt intelligently with all the
questions before the people at present,
and pointed out many glaring cases of
inconsistency on the part of the pres-
ent Government.

"It is a pleasure for Liberals to feel
that there are still some townships
that remain true to Liberalism," said
he. "The good old township of West-
minster has always stood true to Lib-
eralism, and when this by-election is
over I feel sure that you will have one
of the finest and truest candidates rep-
resenting you in the House in the
person of Mr. Laidlaw."

Mr. Urquhart, who has just finish-
ed addressing you, is a Liberal, and I
and others have often wondered how
he ever secured three terms as mayor
defeating the Hon. G. E. Foster for
member for one of the Toronto's, and
I am glad to see that men of his type

who have been out of politics for so
long are throwing themselves into this
fight for the abolition of the bar.

"I can't tell you how glad I am of
having the opportunity of speaking a
few words in behalf of the man of
high ideals who is to be the standard-
bearer of the Liberals in East Middle-
sex. He may not be elected this time,
but just as sure as the sun rises to-
morrow Mr. John Laidlaw will one
day represent East Middlesex in the
House, and I hope it will be after the
27th of this month."

Not a Square Deal.
The Whitney Government is not
giving a square deal to the agricultural
interests of Ontario. Although the
sum of \$10,000,000 is set aside for ag-
ricultural purposes today, the actual
percentage that goes to agriculture
out of that is much smaller than it
was a few years ago, when the ex-
penditure was much smaller.

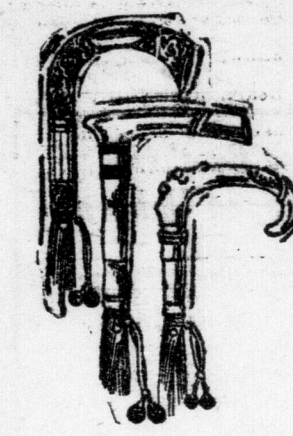
This statement that the Liberals
opposed cheap power for the farmers
is untrue. The Liberals have always
urged upon the Government to give to
the agriculturists all the advantages
of cheap power. Hon. Adam Beck was
formerly a Toronto newspaperman and
who never had any technical or prac-
tical experience, is now one of the
agricultural deputies in charge of the
experimental school.

"The agriculturists in Ontario to-
day realize that they are not receiving
the consideration due them, and that
the manufacturer and merchant in the
city are receiving far more consid-
eration than they," continued the speaker.
"Why do the things you have in
your homes cost you three times as
much today as they did a few years
ago? Because the combines of this
country are doing business in their
own way without fear of prosecution
by the Attorney-General's depart-
ment."

Tax Reform.
He also touched on tax reform and
the educational system, and pointed
out that the school books sold today
