can occasion little surprise, even to the casual observer, to learn that the report of G. Howard Ferguson, M. P. P., by al commissioner on the Trent Canal rk, was unjust, partisan and untrue. It has been condemned as unjust and untrue even by Conservative members at

Mr. Ferguson's recent career in the Legislature has been such as to stamp him as a bitter partisan, who would go to any lengths to save his colleagues. He was the man who squelched the Proudfoot charges against W. J. Hanna. He was the man who tried, in the dying hours of the Legislature, to besmirch the good name of Newton W. Rowell. He was the man who served the Borden Government as a royal commissioner while still a member of the Provincial Parliament, thereby violating the statutes. His colleagues at Toronto forced special legislation through Parliament to clear his name, after one of the memorable fights of the Opposition on behalf of principle.

In this job, which he undertook illegally on behalf of the Borden Government, It now appears he followed the same tactics which he used in connection with the Proudfoot charges. He refused to hear any evidence except what he was looking for in the interests of a Liberal scandal. He instructed his stenographer to eliminate what would not contribute to his ends. Worse still, he is accused of padding his report with evidence from persons who gave no evidence. When his report was prepared he caused a garbled and partisan synopsis to be given to the

It is bad enough for the Conservative party to keep such a man as this in its ranks. At Ottawa he was called a "disgrace to the public life of Canada." But It is worse still that the Conservative party should stoop to such miserable tactics. The policy followed by G. Howard Ferguson was the same as that followed in the Lynch-Staunton investigation of the National Transcontinental Railway. Both have now been exposed.

With what has been already spent for this purpose, and the estimate of what is necessary to finish it, the total cost of this section will be about \$53,000,000. And we have been informed on the authority of the Government that the company now only needs \$45,000,000 to complete its transcontinental road. In other words, if it had not been for the Rocky Mountain section, the Canadian Northern would not have needed a further aid of \$45,000. 000 from the country.

### THE SENATE'S RESOLUTION.

THE masterly commentary upon the C.N.R. proposals is contained in the resolution of the Senate, passed last week. The objections to the measure are summed up in small compass and the sound sense of the Liberal attitude places it squarely before the people. The resolution in full was as

"That this house, before assent. ing to the second reading of this bill, desires to express its opinion that the said bill is adverse to. and does not properly safeguard the true interests of the country, in amongst other respects the fol-"That aid in the form provided

for in the said bill, implying as it does partnership on the part of Canada with Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann, may involve the country morally and otherwise in very large additional expenditure, and will in effect bring about the payment by the Government of the outstanding securities of the C. N. R. system. "The nature of the said partnership is aggravated by the fact that the majority of the stock may be made use of, or disposed of, to

parties hostile in the best interests of the country. "The sanction by parliament of an issue of \$125,000,000 of watered stock is immoral in its nature, and is aggravated by the fact that the taking two-fifths thereof, and that the people of this country will ultimately be made to provide interest on the whole capitalization and the carrying charges will be increased accord-

"It does not appear by the said bill that the additional aid of \$45,000,000 will insure the completion and operation of the Canadian Northern system, which is already charged with securities amounting to more than \$176,000. 000, apart from public aid granted by way of subsidies, land grants. bonds and guaranteed securities, exceeding \$220,000,000, or, in all,

"The mortgages and charges to be given to the Government in virtue of said bill do not constitute a sufficient or reasonable assurance that the Government shall not be called up to pay the 'guar-

anteed securities' at maturity. "The Canadian Northern system has remained to this date a personal undertaking on Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann and no provision is made in said bill for their personally guarantee-

ing the 'guaranteed securities.' The said bill contains no provision preventing the proceeds of the 'guaranteed securities' being applied to the payment of indebtedness of the Canadian Northern system to Sir William MacKenzie and Sir Donald Mann, or to the Mackenzie-Mann Company, Limited, of which they are reputed to be the principal, if not the only

"Under the said bill the 'guaranteed securities' are not to be securities, which may be issued under the 'trust deeds' referred to in sub-section 2, of section 4, and

in section 11 of said bill. "The said bill contains no provision whereby the 'guaranteed security' may through subrogation get the benefit of securities, held by creditors who may be paid, or out of the proceeds of such 'guaranteed securities.'

"No proper evidence has teen given that Sir William Mackenzie or Sir Donald Mann are not directly or indirectly enriching themselves through the building and financing of the Canadian Northern system, or by means of subsidies, land grants or town-sites, which should have inured to the exclusive benefit of the said

"Valuable lands, which may be used for town sites or other purposes, and which have been given to and acquired by the Canadian Northern system, and important enterprises connected with the sald system are not included in the 'guaranteed securities.'

"And this house desires to ascertain whether the Government would not be disposed to facilitate the aid being given on conditions which would not be open to the above mentioned objections."
