## **WESTERN WHEAT** YIELD TO TOTAL 248,423,000 BU.

Rust Has Done Considerable Damage in Prairie Provinces.

Winnipeg, Aug. 23.—(Canadian Press).

—The Manitoba Free Press this morning estimates the wheat yield of the prairie provinces at 248,423,000 bushels in its eighteenth annual crop estimate, the acreage sown being shown as 17,461,000 acres.

In publishing the report, the newspaper calls attention to the fact that the 1921 crop has sustained more reverses than any previous crop included in the estimates and it has been the most difficult of all to estimate on, owing to the widely varying conditions in comparatively limited areas.

The yield of oats is estimated at 357,785,000 bushels (acreage 9,522,000); barley 41,334,000 bushels (1846,700); ffax, 6,039,000 bushels (751,000); rye, 10,885,500 bushels (558,000).

Heavy Rust Damage.

The acreages used for the estimates are those contained in the Dominion Government statistical bulletin of July last.

Viewed in the light of the promise up to the middle of June, the total result is disappointing not only as to yield, but as to grade of wheat, the newspaper says. Nevertheless there is no total failure in any of the provinces, though there are some districts of each province that have not produced bread and seed.
Rust has probably done the most damage, but sawfly, hail and heat have been responsible for heavy losses in many sections.

With the single possibility of loss by frost to the very late crops in the northern sections or all the provinces, the crop is practically made and in Manitoba a very material portion of the threshing is done. Labor supply on the whole seems to be sufficient, for while some districts report a shortage at the moment, it is more a matter of adjustment than of actual scarcity, the report says.

### GIANT DIRIGIBLE ON TEST TRIPS BEFORE ATLANTIC FLIGHT

Howden, England, Aug. 23.— The dirigible ZR-2, purchased from Great Britain by the United States, commenced a trial trip at 7:10 o'clock this morning. Brit-ish and United States aerial of-ficers were in charge of the giant balloon, which will start on its flight across the Atlantic to the United States as soon as practic-

It was intended that today's flight would be the final test of the great airship before the commander, Louis H. Maxfield of the United States navy and his crew formally took charge of the craft. There were about 25 people aboard.

Three hundred men carefully guided the craft from the hangar where it had been waiting suitable flying conditions.

The commander of the ground party megaphoned the order "cast off," and the 700-foot long silvery gas bag glided upward into the clear morning sky. If the conclusion of today's test should be successful, Commander Maxfield, with the concurrence of the naval department in Washington, will take over the craft. The next step will be the training of the crew in one or two fifteen or twenty hour flights, and then, barring unexpected difficulties, all will be ready for the jump-off toward America.
