## CROWN PRINCE MADE REGENT

relinquished some of his duties to Prince Michi, and the prince received foreign diplomats on an important state function. In the spring of 1921, the emperor broke an ancient Japanese tradition by sending the crown prince on a visit to Europe.

It was reported at that time that his proposed tour abroad was due to an intrigue to annul his engagement to marry the Princess Iwakura. About this time there was a movement to have him declared Prince Regent owing to the long-continued illness of his father. He was called for Europe. It was announced in Tokyo that his wedding would take place after he returned from abroad.

In the spring of 1921, the prince visited England, Scotland, France, Belgium, Holland and Italy—the first Japanese prince who ever left his native country. He was accompanied by Admiral Togo, who for a number of years had directed his education.

He was made an honorary general in the British army and a knight of the Order of the Bath by King George, was entertained by the royal houses of the other nations and received in audience by Pope Benedict.

In an interview in London, the prince said he looked forward to a visit to the United States at some other time.

Upon his return to Tokyo, after seven months' absence, the crown prince issued a message to the nation, in which he said he appreciated the hospitality and courtesy accorded him everywhere, and that he believed his trip would be helpful to Japan.

"I confess," he added, "that there are a number of things which we Japanese have yet to learn from the countries I visited. It is my ardent wish that the whole nation apply itself with redoubled energy to the promotion of national prosperity by adopting whatever is good that foreign countries possess."

## Universities Confer Degrees On Briand

New York, Nov. 25.—Aristide Briand, premier of France, was a passenger on the steamship Paris, sailing today for Havre, on his trip home after outlining the position of his country in regard to limitation of armament before the Washington conference. M. Briand arrived here from the capital yesterday, and spent a busy day before his departure. He received the degrees of Doctor of Laws from Columbia and New York universities and gave his farewell message to a dinner given by the Lotus Club in his honor.

In this address the head of the French cabinet repeated his assertions before the Washington conference that France was the champion of peace and disarmament, and that the rest of the world, and that the disarmament of France would be a temptation for further action by the old militarist and imperialist group in Germany, which brought on the war.

Until satisfied that a new and peaceful Germany had been born, he said, France could not reduce her army below the margin of safety.

Expect Conference To End by Christmas

Washington, Nov. 25.—Belief was gaining ground today among foreign delegations that the armament and far eastern conference might adjourn the first fortnight of December to give time to the delegations to go home for Christmas.

Some members of the delegations have already secured passages aboard the Aquitania, sailing from New York on Dec. 13. In the interval of the adjournment the committees and subcommittees of experts would continue their work to have resolutions ready on the reassembling of the conference.
