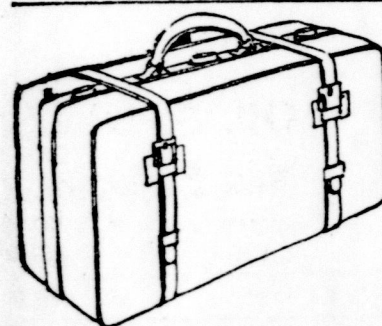

**PRIVY COUNCIL DEFERS AWARD**

ING. T. R. CASE

Lord Birkenhead Announces Judgment Reserved When Arguments Concluded.

**SURE APPEAL SUCCESSFUL**

Counsel For Shareholders Confident Arbitration On Value Will Be Reheard.

LONDON, July 13.—(By Canadian Press Cable).—"Their lordships will take time to consider what advice to tender his majesty." The lord chancellor, Lord Birkenhead, in this way announced this afternoon upon conclusion of argument, that the privy council had reserved judgment regarding the appeal of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk against the award of arbitration in connection with the value of the preference and common stocks of the railway upon its acquisition by the Canadian government.

The opinion among counsel is that their lordships will probably allow the appeal on the ground that the judgment of Sir Walter Cassels included matter from the Drayton-Acworth report, and also because of the rejection of evidence concerning reproduction value.

It was plain, however, during the closing stages of the proceedings that their lordships were fully impressed with the gravity of rehearing the arbitration. This was especially evident when Sir John Simon, on behalf of the Grand Trunk Railway in his final address, again referred to the Cassels judgment.

**Claim Matter Grave.** Lord Carson asked: "Supposing we come to the conclusion that Sir Walter Cassels was wrong and we refer the matter back; what will happen then? Will Sir Walter Cassels give another judgment eliminating certain portions of his previous judgment, and relying on other facts? It is a very grave matter, you see."

Sir John Simon replied: "I do not at all shut my eyes to the fact that a rehearing of the arbitration is a very serious undertaking, but if there be a complaint on a point of law having some substance behind it I am sure the fact of setting it right will entail considerable time, labor and expense, but will not defeat your lordships' judgment."

"This is not like an ordinary case where you can call further evidence," declared Lord Carson. "According to your case, you have an arbitrator who would have to eliminate from his mind something which already has affected it."

"I submit that if it is established that a re-hearing should take place, one cannot refuse it because somebody may be embarrassed," retorted counsel for the railway.

**Judge May Refrain.** Lord Carson suggested it would be extremely difficult for a judge who had once made up his mind to be asked to give a second judgment. Sir John Simon then declared that Sir Walter Cassels under the circumstances might consider it desirable, if a re-hearing was ordered, to refrain from participating.

Lord Carson asked if their lordships gave judgment in a certain direction would it involve a re-hearing de novo.

Sir John Simon thought it would. Later he declared that Sir Walter Cassels' references to the Drayton-Acworth report treated as gospel statements describing the Grand Trunk as a bankrupt company.

"If E. J. Chamberlain went crying 'stinking fish' in an endeavor to borrow money, one cannot penalize the shareholders for it," Sir John declared.

The lord chancellor said that one reasonable person might take the view that the evidence ought to have been admitted and another reasonable person might take the view that the evidence, even if admitted, would not help him as an arbitrator reaching a decision.

**AROUSES KEEN INTEREST.** OTTAWA, July 13.—(By Canadian Press).—"Intimation that the Privy Council may allow the appeal of the Grand Trunk shareholders against the findings of the board of arbitration has aroused keen interest in the capital and the Privy Council's arbitration body will be eagerly awaited. Until there is a definite ruling by the Privy Council, however, no decision can be reached here as to the next step to be taken."

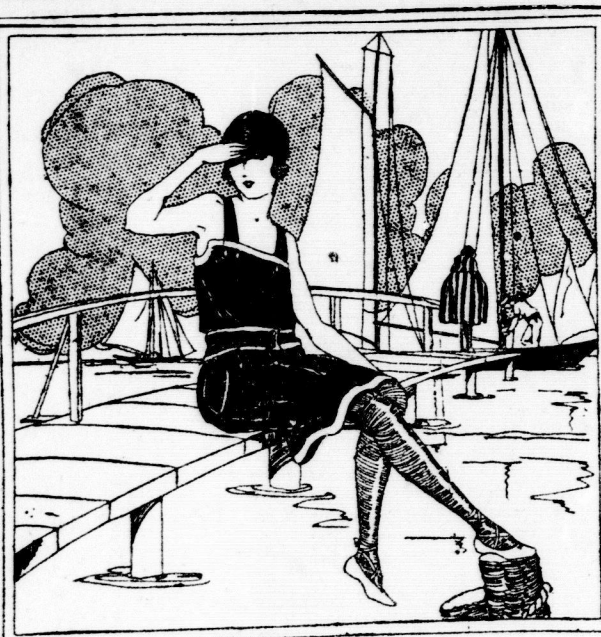
It is pointed out that the judgment, whatever it may be, will have no effect on the actual acquisition of the Grand Trunk system by the Dominion government. The work of the board of arbitration, which was composed of Sir Walter Cassels, Sir Thomas White and Hon. William H. Taft, was to determine the value of the first, second and third preference stock and of the common stock of the company. The majority award of the board, signed by Sir Walter Cassels and Sir Thomas White, declared that these stocks were valueless. From this view Mr. Taft dissented.

If the Privy Council should decide that evidence rejected by the board should have been admitted, it seems likely that the arbitrators will sit again for the purpose of hearing evidence. Whether or not the evidence will have the effect of changing the award is a question which cannot be answered at present.

**REQUESTS BAIL FOR MAN CHARGED WITH SLAYING**

Defense For Alberto Naticchio Asks Judge to Accept Sureties.

TORONTO, July 13.—Judgment has been reserved by Justice Middleton on the application of R. H. Yeates for bail for Alberto Naticchio, who is held at Hamilton, charged with the murder of Tony Marino at a Christmas party in 1919.

Marino was shot, and at the same time Naticchio disappeared, later being located at Langford, Pa., in March of this year.

A hat, which was found near the scene of the shooting, was identified as belonging to Naticchio, though Mr. Yeates thought the identification by no means conclusive, as there were many such hats.

Judgment was reserved to enable Justice Middleton to read the evidence, though he had but little hope that he would change his mind. The only case in which he would interfere, he said, were those in which the offence was evidently not murder, though murder was charged.

**MORGENTHAU STRIVES TO SAVE AUSTRIAN INDUSTRIES**

Former United States Ambassador to Turkey to Organize Capital.

PARIS, July 13.—Henry Morgenthau, former United States ambassador to Turkey, announced today that he was arranging to form an international corporation to be capitalized at from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000, for the purpose of reorganizing Austria's industry to show the world that it is possible to prevent the bankruptcy of European states.

Mr. Morgenthau, who has just returned to Paris from Vienna, where he was assured of the co-operation of the Austrian government, is now developing his project with various financiers.

Mr. Grant is survived by his wife, who was Miss Isabel Watson, and one daughter, Miss Margaret Grant of Los Angeles, and three sisters, Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. (Dr.) West, Woodstock, and Mrs. (Dr.) Bates, Toronto.

He was born in Elgin, Scotland, and came to Canada with his parents when about five years of age. The family came direct to Woodstock, where the father engaged in the tanning business, and established the retail boot and shoe business on Dundas street, in which he was succeeded by his son.
