A letter said to have been found after her arrest, reads:
"If imprisoned, I will hunger-strike. I don't know whether they will let me die, but if they do, pray for me that I may be as brave as those who have gone before me." Mary MacSwiney is a sister of the ate Terence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, who died in Brixton prison, in London, on Oct. 25, 1920, after hunger-strike lasting 73 days.

## Does Not Expect U. S. To Place Embargo On Canadian Grain.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.-(By Canadian Press.)-No embargo on Canadian grain is probable, despite the demands of the American Farm Bureau Federation and other farm organizations. This is the infor-mation which is given out here unofficially from sources inti-mately in touch with the situ-ation. It is pointed out that to embargo Canadian grain now, inasmuch as there are thou-sands of Canadian cars on this side of the line, would probably mean retaliation should the United States desire to move grain through Canada, as it sometimes does. Moreover, the United States railroad lines promise soon to relieve the congestion of grain at the small elevators in the west and northwest, and say they are near the of the worst of the car shortage.

TORONTO, Nov. 6.—Blessed by an abundant harvest and a long period of national and a long period of national progress, virtually unmarred by industrial strife, Canadians to-day observed Thanksgiving Day, set aside each year as a national holiday. The day also marked the fifth anniversary of the Battle of Passchendagle of the Battle of Passchendaele, when the Canadian corps, after three weeks of bitter fighting against tremendous odds, carried the ridge of Passchendaele, in which they routed the flower of Hindenburg's storm troops, and in so doing materially hastened the dawn of peace. All these things were remem-bered throughout the Dominion by grateful citizens, whether in attendance of thanksgiving services held in the majority of the churches or at family reunions. The weather was mild from coast to coast, but rain spoiled the day in a great many districts.


