Special Cable to The Advertiser. Peking, May 7.—Twenty-eight for-signers, including Americans, are held as hostages by Chinese bandits, who wrecked China's finest express train in the south of Shantung province and carried off 300 men and women

passengers.
Names of thirteen Americans who were aboard the train have been compiled by the American legation here. Despatches received here up to this hour apparently confirmed earlier re-ports of the capture of Robert P. Scripps, editorial director of the

the name of Rothman. A thousand bandits attacked the train near Lin Cheng, in the southwestern section of Shantung between Pukow and Tien Tsin. A portion of the track was rooted up and the en-gine plunged into the ditch, leaving the passengers an easy prey for the The name of Scripps is not given in


