ANTHRACITE COAL SHORTAGE IS SEEN

Grave Possibilities of Struggle in U. S. Fields Indicated by Reports.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, July 1.—Grave possibilities of an industrial struggle in the anthracite regions of the United States, upon the termination of the present wage agreement on September 1, were indicated by the latest reports received from these fields, stated Dr. Charles Camsell, chairman of the Dominion fuel board, today. Householders, he declared, insofar as was humanly possible, should therefore obtain at once supplies of what-ever kind of domestic fuel they intend to use during the fall and winter months.

Dr. Camsell pointed out that even in normal conditions, transportation facilities were strained to the limit in the fall and winter to handle the peak loads which occur at that time, and if trouble developed in the American anthracite coal fields during the coming fall, the country would probably be confronted again with the necessity of begging for small amounts of any kind of fuel at any price from our coal dealers.

MONSTER CELEBRATION STAGED IN STRATHROY

Lieut.-Gov. Cockshutt Joins in Activities—Large Crowd in Attendance.

Strathroy, July 1.—Over 12,000 celebrated Canada's national holiday by attending the celebration here today, the biggest single day's celebration held in Canada. The committee's slogan has been "bigger and better than ever," and today's event broke all previous records. Nothing happened to mar a day replete with entertainment, and all advertised attractions were run off on scheduled time.

The ball game between Ailsa Craig and Strathroy Jacks, which the latter won 8 to 3, entertained the morning crowd. The big program of races and sports in the afternoon was opened by the arrival of the guest of honor and patron, Lt.-Col. Harry Cockshutt, lieutenant-governor of Ontario.

Guests welcomed.
His honor came by motor, and was met at the town limits by a reception committee consisting of Allan McDougall, reeve of Caradoc, president of the celebration committee; Walter Salsbury, vice-president; Lynan Chapman and Wm. Gallagher, past presidents; R. E. Warrnoll, D. McVicar, L. Chapman, Florence Campbell, V. Arnold, M.L.A., North Middlesex; J. G. Lethbridge, M.L.A., West Middlesex; Mayor George Lewis of Strathroy; James R. Bogue and A. P. Malone, president and vice-president, Strathroy chamber of commerce; Councilors Clarence Evey, Arthur Wright and E. Lewis.

His honor, in an open car, headed the procession to the grounds. At the grandstand he was presented with an address of welcome by President Allan McDougall. His honor congratulated the community on their wonderful celebration.

Race Thrills.
A few minutes later the distinguished guest and the huge crowds were thrilled to see Carl Private, an unmarked horse, race the fastest mile done in Canada this season, and establish a track record of 2.09 1/2, with the last half in 1.03.

One of the most exciting events was the equine sack race, in which 14 started. This is a half-mile race, in which riders mount bareback and gather three sacks in the circuit of the track. It was won by Leo Brown, followed by L. Kennedy, Chas. Carruthers, J. Robertson, and G. M. Nair.

Sports Program.
K. Webster, of Glenora, won both 100 yards and 220 dashes by close margins. The former was done in the exceptional time of 10 1/2 seconds, the latter in 23 1/2.

In the barrel boxing competition, Joe Dunstan, of Caradoc, was proclaimed champion by Reeve J. W. Sullivan, who refereed, with Fred Turner, of Strathroy, the contender. Tom Elliott, of Adelaide, and E. Callahan, of Metcalfe, were eliminated in the semi-finals.

During the afternoon, the Sunset Male Quartet, of London, entertained the grandstand crowd most acceptably between the races, and music was furnished all day by the 26th Regiment band, present through the kind permission of Colonel Wm. Clegg.

Lieut. Gov. Cockshutt paid a short visit to the Strathroy General hospital, and expressed himself as much impressed with the hospital, and surprised indeed with the magnitude of Strathroy's Dominion day celebration.

REMEMBRANCE DAY URGED FOR NOV. 11

Empire Service League Proposes Action—Supports Poppy Sale.

Ottawa, July 1.—A recommendation that November 11 be set aside as Remembrance Day throughout the empire, except in such dominions where other arrangements have been made, was passed by the British Empire Service League, in conference here this morning.

Commander Paget-Hett of the British Legion, in proposing the resolution, said that memorials of bronze and stone were not enough. He gave instances of the success of the legion in the sale of poppies on Remembrance Day for the relief of distressed ex-service men. In four years nearly one million pounds had been secured for relief purposes by the sale of poppies.

Field-Marshal Haig in the course of the discussion paid a tribute to the overseas sections of the empire, which had contributed generously to the relief work in Great Britain through the poppy fund.

Captain MacKenzie, speaking for Canada, outlined the methods used in the manufacture and sale of poppies in Canada and added that the Canadian government had promised to have November 11 set aside as Remembrance Day. The Australian and New Zealand delegates pointed out that April 25 was Anzac Day in those dominions, and that services of the Remembrance Day character were held at that time.

FILIPINO VOTERS INCREASE HALF MILLION IN 3 YEARS

Associated Press Despatch.
Manila, July 1.—Approximately 1,800,000 ballots were printed and distributed to the various provinces in preparation for the national election on June 9, when members of the house of representatives, one-half the membership of the senate, and provincial governors and other provincial officers were chosen.

Comparing these figures with those of the election of 1922, there is an increase of approximately 445,000 voters this year.

The province of Pangasinan, in Central Luzon, heads the list of the provinces in the number of voters this year. 129,000 ballots was sent to that province against 123,000 in 1922. 200,000.

The domestic excise taxes for the month were \$108,769.26, an increase of \$37,405.68 over the corresponding month last year. The duties on imports were \$108,769.26, an increase of \$37,405.68. This means that there was an increase in raw materials brought into Canada, accounted for in the rise of import duties collections.

Since the collector of Customs, O. H. Talbot, has had the federal tax collections turned into his department the receipts have swelled the customs house totals. Last month \$101,389.94 in income taxes was collected. The customs totals for the month were \$121,022.41; the excise totals were \$141,069.17. The entire receipts for June were \$363,220.52. The sales tax on imports amounted to \$13,767.71. For June, 1924, they were \$13,127. The increase was \$636.30.

There was a decrease in excise tax on imports. This is considered a good sign. Many of these taxes were on high priced imported motor cars. The tendency is toward buying Canadian-made cars.

Statistics showed a decrease of \$155.60 over June last year. The amount collected was \$412.87. Domestic excise duties were \$37,299.91, an increase of \$15,860.56. This was in a measure due to the increasing popularity of hops occasioned by the brewing of 4.4 beer.
