Rifle volleys and revolver shots are heard continually. The mob sacked many liquor shops and broke street lamps. The railroad traffic is generally interrupted.

RUSSIANS ON PAROLE.

Washington, June 23.—In response to a request cabled the war department by the governor-general of the Philippines in behalf of the Russian Admiral Enquist to be allowed to return his sick and wounded officers and men, unarriving their parole not to engage in asstillities during the war and to be allowed to bring certain material for repairing the damaged ships, the secretary sent the following cable: "You may allow the Russian admiral to embark his sick and wounded officers and men on Russian hospital ship upon their giving parole not to engage in hostilities during war. You may also allow them to bring from Shanghai material for repairing vessels, such as cordage, sail cloth, waste and oil for machinery etc.; but the vessels are still to remain in internment."
