All day long the entrance is lined by rows of beggars, to whom the piety of the Russian prilgrim compels him to extend his charity. These persons have bought from the monks the privilege of occupying the profitable stations where they pass the day, and it is said that some of these posts are valued as high as two thousand roubles a year. The Government is perfectly aware of the abuses of the whole system, but in the face of the superstition of the people and the firm attitude of the clergy it is powerless.
