St. John, Nfld., Sept. 16—The Peary expedition returned yesterday by the Falcon, all well. Three members, Peary, Lee and Hanson remained northanotheryear. Early in March, Peary and seven companions with twelve sledges and 92 dogs started for the pole. Almost from the start they were beset with frightful storms, culminating in an equinoxial gale lasting 34 hours, blowing 48 miles an hour. The thermometer dropped 60 below zero. Four of the party were bad. If y frost-bitten, and many dogs perished. The sick men were sent back to camp and the others continued on. Three afterwards had to give up the journey, being unable to make sufficient progress to render completion possible and returned after an absence of 45 days. They only travelled 130 miles.

They brought back only 26 dogs. They accomplished much exploration in May and June and mapped Melville bay and a long extent of coastline in Inglefield gulf.
