in Montreel, all of different kinds—that is, founded on different plans, and governed by different rules. Their names are as follows:—

- 1. The Congregational Nunnery.
- 2. The Black Nunnery, or Convent of Sister Bourgeoise.
- 3. The Grey Nunnery.

The first of these professes to be devoted entirely to the education of girls. It would require, however, only a proper examination to prove, that with the exception of needle-work, hardly anything is taught excepting prayer and catechism; the instruction in reading, writing, &c., in fact, amounting to very little, and often to nothing. This Convent is adjacent to the next to be spoken of, being separated from it only by a wall. The second professes to be a charitable institution for the care of the sick, and the supply of bread and medicines for the poor; and something is ione in these departments of charity, although but an in-
