TO BREEDERS OF DRAUGHT HORSES.

Notice is hereby given that at the annual meeting of the Dom-
inion Draught Horse Breeders' Society, to be held in Clinton,
second Wednesday in December next, a recommendation
will be presented by the Directors to change the present stand-
ard of registration to read as follows:

"All Imported Stallions of the Clydesdale and of the Shire
Breeds, which travelled in the Dominion prior to 1886, having
pedigrees satisfactory to the Council, may be registered free of
charge, and the progeny of such stallions shall be eligible for
registry. With this exception, every application by entry must
be accompanied by proof that the animal sought to be registered
is the produce of a sire registered in either of the Clydesdale or
Shire Stud Books of Great Britain, Canada or the United States,
or of an imported horse registered in the Stud Book of this So-
ciety, and a dam with at least one cross of either of the breeds
named."

Applications under the present standard of two crosses (either
or both of which may be unregistered) will be accepted up till
December 1st. Blanks and further information may be had by
addressing the Secretary.

Stock Notes.

The Messrs. J. & W. Watt, Salem, Ont., showed 4 grand bull
calves this year. One of these, a roan, by Barnpton Hero and
imp. Lovely 19th, is a fine, upstanding, level, broad backed fel-
low, well fortified in all the essentials that lovers of the beef
breeds are anxious to see. He has thick, smooth crops, grand
quarters and flank, and is a mellow handler. The sight of this
calf makes one wish that old Barnpton Hero might live for
ages. He was an easy first wherever shown.

Mr. Geo. Keith, Elora, Ont., has brought out some very nice
young animals in the fat classes during recent years. This year
again he was quite successful both at the Industrial and the
Provincial, as the prize lists will show. He is still showing ani-
mals the get of Barnpton Hero, that king of Canadian stock-
getters in the Shorthorn line. A 2-year steer and heifer of his
lot were the same which won the gold medal at Guelph Fat
Stock Show last year.

The Messrs. R. & S. Nicholson, Sylvan, Ont., were creditable
exhibitors of Shorthorns at the leading exhibitions. The show
lot consisted of 4 bulls, a 2-year heifer, a yearling heifers and
a heifer calf. Most of these were by their former stock bull Prince
Albert. The present stock bull, a red of much quality, was 1st
in his class at Toronto, Ottawa and Hamilton. He is by the
Cruikshank bull Vermont, and out of Maid of Promise, of the
Miss Ramsden family.

Mr. R. R. Sangster, of Lancaster, Ont., sold 3 head of Short-
horns at Ottawa Provincial Exhibition, to Mr. J. J. Wilson,
Bear Brook P. O., Ont. These were the bull Starlight Duke
and, for three years past in use in Mr. Sangster's herd, the 2-
year heifer Rose of Aberdeen, and the Mantilini 1-year heifer
Rose of Hillhurst. At the Glengary county show the herd of
Mr. S. was awarded 1st prize bulls, 1 3rd and 2 diplomas.

The Shorthorn herd of Mr. R. R. Sangster, Lancaster, Ont., is
progressing very favorably. It has been gathered with a good deal
of care and expense and now contains largely the Scotch Short-
horn element. His show herd which carried the second at the
Provincial, were drawn largely from that of the Hon. M. H.
Cochrane, Hillhurst. It was headed by Count of the Empire,
bought at the sale of J. C. Snell, Edmonton, in 1886. Mr.
Sangster's is one of the best herds in the eastern part of Ont-
ario.

Mr. D. Currie, of Everton, is strong in At Shorthorn bulls.
At the Provincial, Ottawa, this year he showed 3 fine fellows.
One, a calf, Baron 3d, by imp. Baron, at six and a half months
weighed 755 lbs. He is out of a dam come of the Adam Fergu-
son stock. The second, a 2-year bull, Prince of Sunnyside, and
bred at Sunnyside from the Queen of the May family, carried
and prize, the 1st going to the grandly good bull of R. & S.
Nicholson, Sylvan. The third is the massive bull The Baron,
the sweepstakes bull both last year and this at the Provincial.
His dam is Jessamine, and sire, British Flag, bred by S. Camp-
bell, Kinellar.

Mr. Andrew Gilmore, Oakdale Farm, Huntingdon, P. Q.,
writes: "My Aberdeen-Angus Polls arrived home on the 11th
August last, being the first of this breed ever brought into the
district of Lehigham. They are a handsome pair of cattle,
and were highly commended at the district show, held at Hunt-
ingdon in September. Have made the following sales: One
Shorthorn bull to John Cunningham, Huntingdon, P. Q.; one
ditto, to James Ferns, Huntingdon, P. Q.; one Yorkshire boar,
to David Cairns, Athelstone, one ditto, C. Blanchford, Hunt-
ingdon, P. Q.; one ditto, to James Gillies, Kelso, P. Q.; one boar
and sow, to Wm. Patterson, Pomeroy, P. Q., and one to S.
Petit, St. Antoine Abbe, P. Q.

Mr. Thos. Shaw, Riverside, Woodburn P. O., Ont., exhibited
at six exhibitions, commencing with the Great Central, Hamil-
ton. Two herds were shown, one pure Shorthorn, headed by
imp. Waterloo Warrier (47223), since sold to Mr. Chas. Youngs,
Brookdale, Ont., and the other, Shorthorn grade. These were
all bred by Mr. Shaw, except the bull above named, and one
female. At Hamilton they won three herd prizes, and in all 11
herd prizes—no prizes on herds having been offered at one of the
shows. The two herds won 76 first prizes, and out of 130 prizes
won on these and Shrophire Down sheep, 92 were firsts, the rest
nearly all seconds, and were got by making a double entry. They
were brought out by the herdsman, Mr. Leslie Smith, whose
success is a fine and well-earned compliment.

Mr. J. Dryden, M. P. P., Brooklin, Ont., was a great prize
taker with his Shorthorns and Shrophires this year at the Pro-
vincial, Ottawa. We understand he never at any one show car-
ried away so large a number of valuable prizes. It is encourag-
ing to see men of this class patronizing the Provincial so heart-
ily. So long as this is the case the province cannot do without
this useful old show. His Shorthorn herds at Ottawa carried
1st both in the imported and the Canadian classes. The imp.
herd, bred at or directly from Sittytown stock, was headed by
Prince of the Realm, a good, rich roan, bred at Leithen, and
the Canadian herd followed a 1-year bull of Mr. Cruikshank's
Orange Blossom family, and by Ned Emperor, who as a year-
ling did so well in our showings in 1886, and who the next year
won for his purchaser, Mr. L. Miller, Maryville, Mo., 13 1st
prizes at state fairs.

Herefords.

Mr. F. A. Fleming, of the Park, Weston, made a good show
of Herefords this year. The most famous in the female line is
Miss Eready (18852), bred at Downton Castle, Ludlow, Eng.,
sire, Downton (Grand Duke (1875), 4182. This cow was a suc-
cessful Royal winner in England. She had a pretty calf at foot
by Conqueror, of the Ontario Experimental Farm. There was
also on hand a beautiful cow, Lily 6th, rich with the blood of
Zealot; Prairie Rose, by Corporal Trim, which won 1st at
Dominion and Provincial Exhibition, Ottawa, 1884. The others
are equally well bred.
