*LAUSANNE TO BERNE, BRUNIG PASS
AND LUCERNE.*

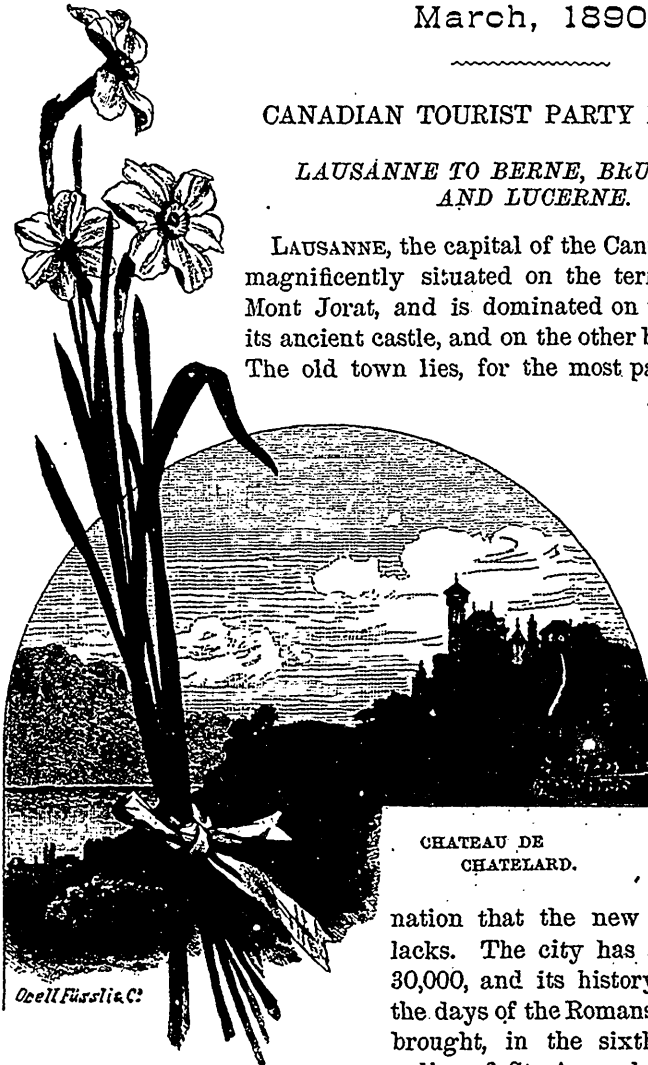
LAUSANNE, the capital of the Canton de Vaud, is magnificently situated on the terraced slopes of Mont Jorat, and is dominated on the one side by its ancient castle, and on the other by its cathedral. The old town lies, for the most part, in a valley,

across which there has been thrown a lofty viaduct, commanding fine views. The very narrow and crooked streets, with their quaint architecture, the overhanging roofs, the grinning gargoyles, and odd dormers, have a fasci-

nation that the new town entirely lacks. The city has a population of 30,000, and its history goes back to the days of the Romans. Hither were brought, in the sixth century, the relics of St. Anne, hence the name,

Laus Annæ; and here, in 1479, were solemnly tried and excom-

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
