A SHOAL BAY PURCHASE.

The Gold Fields of British Columbia, Limited, has bought the business of the Shoat Bay Trading Co., lately owned by Mr. P. N. Smith, together with an hotel, store and small townsite of 160 acres, on which a mining hamlet to be known as Thurlow will be built, and probably in time attract a modest working population. The company will build a new hotel, converting the present premises into a store. The company is also about to let contracts for 750 feet of tunnelling on the Shoal Bay claims that it owns, and as it is well capitalised its efforts should shortly tend to reveal the true worth of the Shoal Bay deposits in general, of the high value of which the respective owners are very confident, though as yet shipments have been merely test ones of modest dimensions.

TO THE POINT.

The New Denver Ledge says:

"The history of the last legislature of British Columbia should be a warning to every miner to gird up his loins for a contest that shall lay cheap Asiatic labor in its final sleep, and among a hundred other legalised abuses, who out the present law by which incorporated companies can get fifty mile claims on the banks of auriferous streams on which only Chinese labor need be employed."

But after all, the Japanese immigrant is the more to be feared, for he will when of low caste work for very small living here the remuneration of the white worker, whilst he has as one of his hopes, ever before him, the idea of largely dominating politically the destinles of western lands, so soon as ever he finds himself and his fellow country men therein settled in sufficing numbers. The Orientalisation of our population is assuredly a great present danger of B. C., and as to this there is far more risk from imitative Japan than from "stand off" China. And Japan can easily spare several millions of its overcrowded, long worked and underpaid lower class laboring population.
