

The first cut here given, represents a chariot race.

But it will be observed by our young readers, that the Apostie makes no reference to this, in illustrating the exercises of the Christian's life; and from this we may learn that there is no chariot prepared to carry us through this world to heaven. The scriptures speak

of a highway cast up for the Lord's redeemed, but there are no carriages upon this way, for it is said, "the redeemed shall walk there." And thus the Christian inquires—

"Shall I be carried to the skies, On flowery beds of ease? While others fought to win the prize; Or sailed through bloody seas?"

No; we must travel on foot to heaven if we ever get there.



Here is a picture of a foot race; and this is frequently spoken of by the Apostle in his epistles, "Know ye not that they which run in a race, run all, but one receiveth the prize. So run that ye may obtain, 1 Cor. ix, 24. In these Grecian

races only one could obtain the prize, however many were running,—but in the Christian race all may come off victorious. Hence the Apostle, in the 26th verse of the same chapter says of himself, "I therefore so run, not as uncer-
