Rev. M. McKinnon was inducted yesterday into the pastorate of St. Andrew's, Eldon.

This pulpit of Lynedoch church was filled Sabbath, Oct. 28, by Rev. W. Burns, Agent of Knox College.

Rev. J. Carmichael, of Columbus, Ont., has received a unanimous call from Knox church, Portage la Prairie.

A Society of Christian Endeavour has been formed in connection with St. Andrew's church, Sault Ste. Marie.

Rev. R. H. Craig, who has been filling Dr. Bennett's pulpit, Almonte, is to have charge of the Presbyterian congregation at Merrickville for a time.

At a congregational meeting of Melville church, Pergus, Oct. 29, it was resolved to extend a call to Rev. Mr. Tolmie. The stipend offered is \$1,000 and a manse.

Rev. Mr. Lord has declined the call from Pickering congregation. Rev. R. M. Craig, of Dunbar, is Moderator of the Session of the vacant congregation.

Rev. Robert Hadow, B.A., a recent graduate of Knox College, has received a unanimous call to the pastorate of Knox church, Milton, Toronto Presbytery. Stipend promised \$300 and a manse.

ANNIVERSARY service will be held in the Presbyterian church, Appleton, on Sabbath, Nov. 11, when the Rev. M. Stacey and J. Allister Murray, of St. Andrew's church, of London, will officiate.

Rev. J. L. Campbell, missionary at Gore Bay for the last three years, has left for his new field, Carmona. Before leaving Gore Bay Mrs. Campbell was presented with a number of handsome gifts and a purse of money.

Rev. J. D. McGillivray, of Clifton congregation, Presbytery of Toronto, N.S., has removed with his family inland for the winter. His post office address is Brantford, Ontario. Mr. McGillivray is open to engagements for supply.

At the communion services of Shelburne and Primrose, the Session received into membership, on Sabbath, the 21st ult., fourteen new members. The total addition last year was sixty persons, thirty being on profession of their faith.

In accordance with the petition of the congregations of Consequoy and Hillier, Rev. John Snodgrass has been appointed by the Presbytery of Kingston as their ordained missionary, beginning his work among them as such on Sabbath, 21st ult.

Rev. R. M. Craig, pastor of Dunbar-congregational, Presbytery of Whitby, has returned, much improved in health, from a four months' vacation, spent chiefly in Malton and the North-West. Mr. Craig resumed his pastoral duties on Sabbath, Oct. 25.

OWING to the growth of the congregation, the Session of Knox church, Kincardine, has been strengthened by the ordination and induction into the eldership of Messrs. J. Mather, Malcolm Thompson, John Watson, A. Campbell (Inspector of Public Schools), A. H. Smith, B.A., and Alex. Ross.

A very successful musical entertainment, under the auspices of the Young Ladies' Aid Society of St. Paul's church, Bowmanville, was held on the evening of Tuesday, 2nd inst. There was a very large audience present, and the local press speaks in the highest terms of the character of the entertainment.

The fourteenth annual convention of the County of Waterloo Sabbath School Association was held in Berlin, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. Rev. J. A. R. Dickson, of Galt; Rev. Donald Tall, of Uxton; Rev. J. S. Hardie, of Ayr; Rev. Alex. Jackson, of Galt, amongst others, taking a prominent part.

Miss A. McLaren, daughter of Mr. Jas. McLaren, Lakeside, and sister of Rev. A. McLaren, M.A., Springfield, Manitoba, has been appointed with her brother, G. G. McLaren, to take charge of the Indian boarding school at Binji, Manitoba. Miss McLaren has lived with her brother at Springfield since his settlement there, three years ago.

DR. CAMPBELL, of Seaford, writing to the Sun an account of his trip to Victoria, B.C., mentions that Rev. P. McF. McLeod, lately of Toronto, is very much interested in the work of Christianizing the Chinese of that city. Dr. Campbell seems to be somewhat influenced by local prejudice in his estimate of the apparent insuperability of the task of converting the Chinese. Dr. Campbell, however, rightly protests against the "chain gang" system as a degrading institution.

THE 21st anniversary of the Toronto Y.M.C.A. will be held in Association Hall this evening. Reports of the work for the past year will be presented. An address on the subject, "The Good Old Times," will be delivered by Rev. Dr. Dowling, of Cleveland. The choir of Metropolitan church will furnish music. Next Sunday, at 4 p.m., service will be held, when Rev. Dr. Dowling will preach. A cordial invitation to be present at both meetings is extended to all friends of the Association.

A NEW church built by the Diligent River Section of the congregation of Parrboro, N.S., was dedicated Sabbath, Oct. 21, Rev. Thos. Cumming, of Truro, preaching morning and afternoon to very large audiences. One zealous elder and his family drove over fifteen miles to be present.

THE Havelock correspondent of the *Norfolk Advertiser* says:—Everything is prosperous in the village, and to keep pace with the times we are glad to notice that the flock under Mr. Madill are helping things along by erecting a new church on George Street. The church when completed will seat about 400 people, and is to be brick, with a basement in it for Sunday School and tea purposes.
