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COMMENT FROM MONTH TO MONTH

Is the Ontario Medical Association Going to Withdraw from Affiliation with the Canadian Medical Association?

A notice of motion presented at the nominal meeting of the former in London last year looks toward this end; and an editorial in the December issue of the Canadian Practitioner and Review brings the matter into active medical politics. In that editorial the history of the foundation of the Ontario Medical Association is given; and some reasons advanced for such divulsive action, namely, "considerable friction" between the executives of the two bodies, and the too frequent setting aside the annual meeting of the Ontario Medical Association. Doubtless the latter is the main reason, though "considerable friction" may point to unsatisfactory financial arrangements. As the editorial referred to professes a desire for a dispassionate discussion, there would seem to be no reason to doubt that all matters could be arranged to better satisfaction in a very amicable way, and the two associations proceed to fulfil their destiny with mutual admiration for and help to each other.

It was at the annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association in Vancouver in 1904 that the question of re-organization
