The number of employees of the royal commission on pilotage (exclusive of consultants) has varied from year to year and the total expenditures in salaries during the period Nov. 1, 1962 to Feb. 1, 1968 has amounted to \$368,200. Following are the names of the persons now employed by the royal commission on pilotage with the annual emolument each receives from the royal commission: G. W. Nadeau, Secretary, director of research and asst. counsel (on loan from Dept. of Transport). (Terminable allowance \$6,429 yearly). F. C. Morissette, Asst. secretary (on loan from the Public Service Commission). (Terminable allowance \$2,500 yearly). Capt. J. A. Heenan, Technical adviser, annual salary \$12,600. Cdr. C. H. Little, English editor, annual salary \$15,000. Cdt. Geo. Sabouret, French editor, annual salary \$15,000. Mrs. J. Lamontagne, Clerical staff, annual salary \$6,256. Mrs. E. Tzopa, Clerical staff, annual salary \$5,847. Mrs. D. Chabot, Clerical staff, annual salary, \$5,594. Mrs. E. Havercroft, Clerical staff, annual salary \$5,571. Mrs. Y. Nadeau, Clerical staff, annual salary \$5,400. Mrs. C. Alary, Clerical staff, annual salary \$5,228. Mrs. M. Heatley, Clerical staff, annual salary \$4,093. Mr. L. Menard, Clerical staff, annual salary \$4,021.

5. The royal commission's report to the government will appear in 5 parts, each contained in a separate volume or group of volumes. Part I will be the main one; it will direct attention to the present state of the pilotage legislation in Canada, will report on its pilotage legislation in Canada, will report on its adequacy or otherwise in the light of existing conditions as disclosed by the evidence and will recommend the basic changes that should be made in the law, including the pilotage organization, to meet the present and foreseeable requirements of the pilotage service. The commission expects to be in a position to present this first part of its report to the government in about 6 to 8 weeks. The other parts of the report, which will be in the nature of supporting documents, will report on the factual situation in each of the 25 pilotage districts in Canada, including those on the great lakes. These separate reports (part II-part V) will be submitted to the government progressively as they are completed, which it is expected may take another year.

FRED PROGRAM, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Question No. 990—**Mr. MacLean (Queens):**

1. What projects are (a) in being (b) in prospect under the Fund for Rural Economic Development (FRED) program for Prince Edward Island?
2. What is the total amount of expenditure by the Government of Canada involved in these projects for the fiscal years 1967-68 and 1968-69 (a) for Prince Edward Island (b) for all of Canada?
3. What number of the Public Servants of Canada are employed for this program in Prince Edward Island?
4. Where will such personnel be located?

Hon. Maurice Sauvé (Minister of Forestry and Rural Development): 1. (a) None. (b) Officials of the federal government and the provincial government are currently working together in the preparation of a comprehensive rural development plan for presentation to the governments of Canada and Prince Edward Island.

2. (a) In 1967-68: None. In 1968-69: No specific allotment has been set aside for Prince Edward Island for the fiscal year 1968-69 as there is no way of knowing, at this stage of the development of the plan, how much will be required during the year. (b) In 1967-68, approximately \$6,000,000 will be spent for all of Canada. In 1968-69, parliament will be asked to approve an estimate of \$9,600,000 for all of Canada under the Fund for Rural Economic Development.

3. Two public servants of Canada are working full time in the preparation of a comprehensive rural development plan in Prince Edward Island. In addition, from time to time, in Prince Edward Island, several other federal officials have worked and are working on the preparation of the plan.

4. The two federal officials working full time in the preparation of the comprehensive rural development plan live in Charlottetown, P.E.I.
