SAN SALVADOR—YESTERDAY'S INCIDENTS—REQUEST THAT GOVERNMENT INTERVENE

Mrs. Lucie Pépin (Outremont): Mr. Speaker, yesterday morning in San Salvador, the army once again ignored the rights and freedoms of the citizens of that country. The army surrounded the building where the farmers' association, the UNTE was meeting, and prevented anyone from getting in or out. Subsequently, students staged protest demonstrations in the towns of San Miguel, Santa Ana and San Salvador. One hundred students were injured and more than 300 were arrested and taken away by the army. Where are they being detained? When will they be released? And why did the army take this action?

Mr. Speaker, I want to ask the Canadian Government to act quickly to find out what is happening in this country and especially to get specific information on what happened yesterday. We must help these people in distress, Mr. Speaker.

WESTERN CANADA—GOVERNMENT INITIATIVES

Mr. Geoff Wilson (Swift Current—Maple Creek): Mr. Speaker, in July, 1984, at Prince Albert the P.C. Party promised that western Canadian economic policies and strategies would be developed by and for western Canadians in the belief that regional strengths and prosperity ultimately benefit all Canadians.

Since then the Government has abolished the oppressive National Energy Policy, established a lifetime capital gains exemption for farmers and small business, stood solidly behind prairie farmers against unfair foreign export subsidies, developed a western procurement initiative to increase federal government purchasing in the West, established the \$1.2 billion Western Diversification Program to assist in western Canadian economic growth, participated in oil upgraders at Regina and Lloydminster to enable further processing on the Prairies, and established the National Agricultural Biotechnology Initiative in Saskatoon to support the commercialization of ag-biotech products.

All of this, Mr. Speaker, by a Government that listens to western Canadians, that consults with western Canadians, and co-operates with western Canadians in order to respond to the needs, aspirations, and wishes of westerners.

Together they fought to have women legally defined as persons, and they succeeded.
