

And this enormous increase of revenue is only one of several co-related benefits obtained under the new regime, some of which are only indicated, not detailed, in the reports cited.

Of the extent to which parsimony, apart from all idea of recklessness or imprudence, may account for the management of the same forests under the old regime, illustrations are supplied in Part III.

The details given are copious. They are so because I design my Treatise to be, in some respects, like to a clinical lecture, teaching from a particular case, supplying at once well defined indications of disease, explicit statements in regard to the remedial measures followed, official statements in regard to results obtained, and facilities for indicating the cause or occasion of the evil remedied.

I have prepared a similar account of Sylviculture at the Cape of Good Hope under the old regime and under the new. It is equally with this illustrative of the advantages which have thus been secured, declarative of what has been done there, and suggestive of what might be done elsewhere.
