SHIPPERS MUST OBSERVE LAWS

Watering of Dried Apples to Be Made a Serious Offence.

(Special to The Toronto World)
OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—The minister of agriculture will be asked to introduce legislation next session which will be designed to put a stop to the practice of watering dried apples which they export to other countries.

This is the statement made by the trade and commerce department. What has rendered the new legislation imperative is the fact that shippers of dried apples have been in the habit of soaking them with a certain amount of water in order that they will weigh more, and so a greater price will be obtained. This practice is ruining the credit of Canadian traders in Great Britain and other countries, and as it appears that dishonesty can only be curbed by resorting to punishment, legislation for that purpose is to be introduced.

CANADA OFFERS DAIRY MARKET

New Zealand Sending Butter and Eggs in Large Quantities.

NOT ALL ONE-SIDED

Canada Sending Considerable Paper and Other Articles in Exchange.

(Special to The Toronto World).
OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—That the New Zealanders are alive to the situation in Canada, where the price of foods has risen tremendously and that Canada is an importing country even in what ought to be her own indisputable field, is shown by advice which have been received from New Zealand by the trade and commerce department.

The steamer Niagara left Auckland on Oct. 25 for Vancouver with a cargo of food supplies which included 17,475 boxes of butter and 364 cases of eggs. The shipment of butter is the largest that has ever been sent on one ship to Vancouver, and the shipping of eggs to Canada is a new industry. One thousand feet of cold storage was reserved on the ship for eggs, but even this large space was taken up and an extra ten cases of eggs, in addition to the lot mentioned, were shipped as general cargo, not in cold storage.

Besides butter and eggs it is interesting to note that the Niagara carried to Canada 255 cases of veal, 212 quarters of beef, 25 cases of mutton, 73 bags of meat, 50 tons of flax, 350 cases of gum, and one case of honey.

During the first six months of 1913 the value of the New Zealand imports of Canadian paper was over \$175,000. The Canadian preference is 20 per cent.

The other chief exports to New Zealand during the same period were: Hosiery, \$12,500; apparel, \$25,400; chassis for motor vehicles, \$12,750; agricultural machinery, \$12,750; on which there is no preference, \$8,000; seeds, \$14,000.

The total Canadian exports to New Zealand during the first six months of the present year amounted to \$1,085,135, and in the corresponding period of 1912 the amount was \$890,970. This shows the satisfactory increase of \$194,165.

POTATO FAMINE TO BE DISCUSSED

U. S. Authorities Fear to Spread Disease by Importing Foreign Products.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(Can. Press.)—To protect the United States from foreign potato diseases and to find a way in which some of the foreign crop may be brought in because of this year's scant native supply, estimated to be about 100,000,000 bushels short, Secretary of Agriculture Huston today issued a call for a public meeting here Dec. 18 to discuss the subject.

The call directs particular enquiry as to whether "it is possible to protect this country from known potato diseases by introduction under permit of potatoes which have been inspected and pronounced by foreign experts free from infection."

A few days ago Secretary Huston announced that public hearing would be given also on Dec. 18 as to why the present quarantine against the potato wart should not be extended after Jan. 1 to all Canada and Europe to certain parts of which it now applies.

Nursery stock found free of infection is allowed to enter the country. Under the Plant Quarantine Act it is necessary for the secretary to call a public hearing before this could be applied to potatoes.
