Captured - General Retreat Along River San.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 6.—The Russians have recaptured the Galician Town of Jaroslau and have taken 5,0000 Austrian prisoners, according to a telegram received here from Lem-berg. Jaroslau is 17 miles northwest of the Austrian fortress of Przemysl. The Austrian attempts to cut off the Russian attackers, the message says, finally have broken down and the Austrians now are in retreat along the River San.
