CALEDONIAN CLUB, GALT HAS FINE WAR RECORD

Two-Thirds of Members Have
Enlisted for Overseas
Service.

GALT, Ont., Oct. 29.—It can be truly said that the war has "shot to pieces" the Caledonian Club of this city. This organization was previous to the war in a flourishing condition with a membership of 47, but when the call to arms came, no less than 31 members of the club volunteered their services and as a result the club has ceased to exist. Of the 16 men, 27 enlisted with the Canadian contingents and the other four were reservists. Four of the members with the latter battalion have been killed in action and a fifth died while on active service. Seven have been wounded and one is suffering from shock.

It was a Caledonian Club boy who won the greatest honor that has yet fallen to a Galtian, Lt. Col. Wm. J. Whittall, who received the distinguished conduct medal for bravery on the battle field.

SHOW EXIT FOR SOLDIERS.
Should They Forget Fire Escape in Case of Fire at Old Hospital.

Red lights will be placed at all the exits of the old General Hospital, where some of the soldiers will be housed this winter. have had a long time to prepare for just such an event and thus far have not been thrown off their feet. In fact the Montenegrins hold some strong positions in Austrian territory out of which they will have to be driven before their own country is invaded.

Can Threaten Uskup
There is no change in the southern section of Serbia so far as is known. The report that Uskup had been recaptured is not confirmed. The French, however, claim to have cleared the Bulgarians out of the Veles district. This, if true, would render Uskup an unsafe place for the invaders in the opinion of military men.

In what other way Serbia is to be assisted has not yet been disclosed. Some British troops are co-operating with the French in the south and others are on the way, but where they will be used remains a secret. Russia's plans also have not yet been disclosed, although German sources it is reported that Roumania is about to throw in her lot with the entire allies and will allow the passage of half a million Russian troops thru her territory to attack Bulgaria from the north.

Greece has assured the entente powers that her neutrality remains friendly to them and has pointed out that she already has given them assistance by permitting the landing of their troops at Saloniki.

J. P. MORGAN RALLIES AFTER AN OPERATION

Financier's Recovery From Attack
of Appendicitis Fully
Expected.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—J. P. Morgan, who has been at his desk a little over two months since recovering from bullet wounds inflicted by Erich Muenster, the mad professor of languages, who attempted to take his life last July, is again confined to his bed and under the care of specialists, this time from an attack of appendicitis. Mr. Morgan went under the knife today in an operation which three attendants specialists afterwards referred to as successful in every way. The appendix was removed at noon by Drs. Markoe, Lytle and Smith and the official bulletin, issued by them shortly thereafter, said Mr. Morgan was resting comfortably. Continued progress was expected, unofficially, during the afternoon.

The attack of appendicitis which necessitated an operation was mild in character, it was said, and was in no way attributed to the attempted assassination of Mr. Morgan by Muenster. "The operation was performed at noon today by Drs. Markoe, Lytle and Smith, who report that it was successful in every way and that Mr. Morgan is now resting comfortably," said the statement. "Mr. Morgan's general condition is so excellent that his prompt recovery is looked for."

Upon the stock exchange the effect of this announcement was almost imperceptible.

Mr. Morgan is 48 years of age.

CITIZENS WILL CHEER "ATTACKING" SOLDIERS

Mayor Arranges Escort for Thirty-
Seventh Battalion Which
Reaches Toronto Today.

Col. Bick, commanding officer of the 37th Battalion, phoned Mayor Church yesterday afternoon, that his regiment has reached Port Credit in good shape and everything had been going fine. They are going to capture the city today, arriving at the Humber bridge at 1:30 and at the Exhibition grounds at 2:00 o'clock.

The mayor will meet them at the border of the city and has arranged for a military band to be present to give the first battalion a welcome. He requests all people on the route of march, along the Lake Shore road, and in Dufferin streets, to decorate and give the boys a cheer as they enter the city.

Property Commissioner Chisholm has been instructed to have the flags on all public buildings at top mast in honor of the arrival.

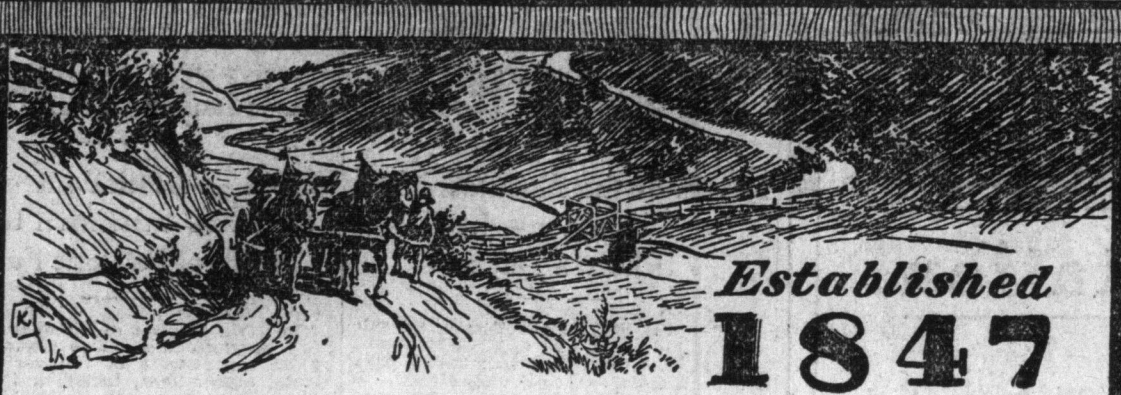

is shown in spring placing orders. A year ago conditions were bad in almost every line of industry and trade. Now manufacturers of iron and steel goods, textiles, canned goods and all staple commodities present a new and encouraging front. Many big plants have materially strengthened their financial position and some are on a dividend paying basis who were deferring dividends a year ago. Wholesale hoot and shoe firms find sorting trade quiet at this moment, but their placing orders are in some cases ahead of last year's. Some factories are busy with government orders. The hide trade has been a little quieter than formerly, and the wool trade is not quite so brisk at the time of writing. The grocery trade continues about normal. The volume of trade in dry goods firms continues to improve as it has in recent weeks. The end of the year will see the volume of trade in the above-named lines of business at least equal to 1914. The issue committee at Ottawa is about to shell committee aggregating \$80,000,000, for which many concerns have sent tenders, and of which they expect to receive their due share.

AMERICANS SEEK INTEREST IN CANADIAN STEEL COS.

Nova Scotia and Dominion Steel Corporation Shares Are Attracting Attention.

The first real movement in the big steel stocks started on the Canadian exchanges yesterday. It has been known for some time past that the Nova Scotia Steel and the Dominion Steel Corporation have been working at high pressure on regular business, to which has been incidentally added some war equipment. These companies now have tenders in at Ottawa for munitions, and expect to get the awards made in a few days. There is a rumor that Americans are endeavoring to secure a big interest in both companies, and are trying to put their holdings without recourse to buying on the Canadian exchanges.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say that a definite wave of optimism is sweeping over eastern Canada and the middle west. Material evidences come to hand week by week in increased bank clearings and in the enormous increases in railway earnings. Far-reaching effect on sorting orders in many lines, but this must improve with the near advent of colder weather. Meanwhile deliberate preparation for a heavy spring trade is under way, as

DOMES CONSOLIDATED MINES LISTED ON THE EXCHANGE

Dome Consolidated Mines has been listed on the Standard Exchange. The capitalization of the company is \$2,500,000, of which \$1,250,000 is in the treasury. The company owns 120 acres in the Dome section of the Porcupine camp. Diamond drilling is to be done for the purpose of locating values beneath the surface. Buildings are already up to house the workmen.

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
