The use of smudge pots in the protection of orchards against frost has been attended with great success, and been attended with great success, and the labor of preparing, lighting and attending these devices has been found to be very great. The latest thing in this line is a frost cartridge, which is said to be much easier to handle and which is much more effective than the pots which have been placed on the ground. The new cartridge may be hung quite close to the fruit without danger. When used, the stoppers are removed and a torch is applied to small amounts of cotton waste, which have been soaked in kerosene and placed at the ends of the cartridge. A cartridge case two feet long and one and one-half inches in Glambert will burn about two hours.


