

BOARD MUST SOON ADOPT POLICY FOR CIVIC CAR LINES

Commissioner Harris Prepared to Run Gerrard Street Cars and Asks What Fares to Charge.

14-FOOT SUBWAY FOR YONGE STREET

Similar Ones For Ossington Avenue and Christie Street—East End Roads to Be Investigated.

Replying to a request of the board of control in the matter of a street car service on St. Clair avenue this winter, Commissioner Harris stated that the St. Clair avenue line could be traversed during the winter months by a temporary track.

Must Have Policy. "Before anything further is done," says he, "relative to equipping and operating car lines, I suggest that the board of control should adopt a definite policy with reference to the operation of all civic car lines, so that in the event of your deciding that the city shall operate all of such, we may plan accordingly, which will result in the maximum of economy."

East End Roads. Nothing will be done with regard to the improvement of east end roads until the board of control has had an opportunity of visiting them, as there are many opinions and objections as to what is best to be done with them, considering the season is so late.

Fourteen-Foot Subway. A fourteen-foot subway will be constructed at North Yonge street, so far as the board of control is concerned. There will be a level approach to the south, but the foundations will be so constructed as to facilitate extra work towards making an 18-foot subway and 2 1/2 per cent. grade to the south, at some future date, should it be required.

More Concessions. The railways must comply with the city's requests, relative to subways along the northern railway belt of the city, according to an order from the Dominion Railway Board issued yesterday.

Corporation counsel Geary asked that Ossington avenue and Christie street crossings be opened. There will be 14-foot subways at these two points. Albany avenue will be closed, and Bridgman avenue will be graded thru to Bathurst street.

Board May Be Bigger. A majority of the board of control are in favor of enlarging the board of police commissioners from three to five, and recommending accordingly.

Mayor Hocken will be given the authority to sign the Humber boulevard agreement with the city, and to purchase 300 extra acres.

The Old Folks' Home will likely be situated on the Industrial Farm. Controller Church thinks that the environment up north would not be suitable for the old people, but it is the intention of the board of control to purchase 300 extra acres.

The Civic Garages. Much dissatisfaction is being evinced over the methods employed in the operation and running of civic garages.

Commissioner Chisholm has recommended the closing of the city garage at St. Lawrence Market. He suggests that each department take charge of its own motors, but the board has asked that he report on the advisability of running the garage and charging each individual department with the expenses incurred.

Crossing Illuminated. The civic hydro-electric system will be ordered to erect the new lighting system, now employed at Boyce avenue, at all railway intersections thruout the city.

City Makes Money. The board of control have approved of the sale of the city lot located at the southeast corner of King and Dufferin streets for \$35,000.

The Toronto Gas Company wanted the same lot for less than \$31,000.

FINED FOR SELLING LIQUOR ILLEGALLY

Provincial Inspector Raided Seven Places Where Liquor Was Sold on Sundays.

As a result of a raid on illicit liquor dives in three eastern counties in the province by Provincial Inspector Morrison, seven convictions were secured by the government and fines amounting to over \$1,200 imposed. All the raids took place last week in the Counties of Northumberland, Durham and Hamilton. The following were the fines: J. H. Whitley, Stirling, \$100 and costs; A. G. Needie, Stirling, \$500 and costs; O. W. Martin, \$100 and costs; George A. VanAllen, Murray Township, \$100 and costs; George Price, Millbrook, \$100 and costs; and William Howard of the Imperial House, Port Hope, \$300 and costs, for selling liquor on Sunday. Local option is in force in all the above places except Port Hope.

JAILED FOR JOY RIDING.

"You'll go to jail for ten days and if it doesn't stop such offences, I'll raise the sentence for joy-riders," said Colonel Denison in sentencing Alfred Barnes for temporarily stealing an automobile from his employer, Henry W. Anthes, 112 Dowling avenue, for joy-riding purposes. Anthes knew nothing of the joy-ride until he appeared in court to contest the charge of speeding, when he found that when his number was taken his car was supposed to be "at home."

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

Edward Allan, a street car conductor, charged with stealing money, estimated at about \$25, from cash boxes, was tried by a jury. The cash boxes, produced in the police court yesterday, showed that someone had been tampering with the slots. Dimes and nickels could slip out when the box was shaken.
