TWO NEW ASSOCIATIONS FOR ONTARIO FOOTBALL

St. Catharines and Ottawa Taken Into the Fold—Juniors Also Accepted.

The semi-annual meeting of the Ontario Football Association took place before the most representative gathering of delegates since the outbreak of the great war.

Those present were: W. Donaldson, Hamilton, president; J. Watson, Toronto, vice-president; R. Muir, secretary, and Messrs. Spencer, Mitchener and Howard, I. & D. Association; Beaton, Provincial League; Collins, United District League; Bellman and Grey, Hamilton and District League; Weatherhead, St. Catharines and District League. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Affiliation was granted St. Catharines District and Ottawa District Leagues, whilst a letter was read from the Western Football Association. It was the unanimous wish of the meeting that the Western Association should affiliate and thus have a united association throughout the province and thus enable all clubs to compete against one another in the Ontario Cup and inter-city games.

After considerable discussion affiliation was granted to the newly-formed Western Football Association. The decision was that players who have taken part in professional games under the jurisdiction of the U.S.F.A. must produce their amateur status signed by the secretary of the U.S.F.A. before they can be registered in Ontario.

In connection with the junior association the status of a junior player was defined as follows:

1. Any player who has not signed a senior form for the current season.
2. A player who has never played in a senior cup competition.
3. A player who signed a senior form during the duration of the war shall not be regarded as having infringed his junior status.

Entries will close for the Ontario senior cup on May 12, and districts must declare their winners on or before the third week in June. The opening rounds will be played mid-week in June, whilst semi-final will take place last Saturday in June, final game being played the first Saturday in July. It is proposed to hold an inter-city fall series between all districts affiliated.

Secretary Muir and N. J. Howard were appointed D.F.A. delegates for the annual meeting in Montreal in August next. The following referees were granted affiliation: Messrs. E. Jowett, L. Jowett, C. Hall, S. Hacking, J. Dobb, B. May, R. McGarity, G. Mills, W. Allen, W. S. Murchie, M. Hurley, J. Lamb, W. Fenby, S. Banks, A. Kerr, R. Broadhurst, F. McLean, H. Armstrong, J. Williams, whilst provisional affiliation was granted Messrs. Clarke, J. Fisher, Kealy, Mitchell, Osborne, Dymont, Stale, Sweet.

Meeting adjourned for delegates to attend the charity game at Dunlop's field.
