## SEIBOLD STOPPED GIBSON'S GALLOPERS

The Leafs have been halted. The glorious winning streak went to sixteen, and the Dunns' Birds put the snail in the wheel. Seibold, late of Connie Mack's Athletics, put on the work yesterday. The former Mackman let Gibson's Giddy Gallopers down with three hits and shut them out. Hubbard did good work also, but a home run scored two counters for the visitors.

It was the tightest kind of a pitching duel, with the Baltimore flinger coming up with the verdict. Twice the Leafs hit into double plays to end promising rallies. Both sides fielded brilliantly and it was a sparkling ball game well to be.

Our real chance went aglimmering in the opening inning. Seibold was wild and passed the first two. Whitehead neatly sacrificed and then Seibold freed take a chance on the hard-hitting Eddie Onslow and he strode free. It was smart baseball, for Holden bumbled to second and a double killing was the order.

The Birds had three men on the paths in their first, but Hubbard put on the screws and stopped them from scoring. Two of the five Baltimore hits were clustered here and only three were secured after this time.
