

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS RATEPAYERS TO DISCUSS DUNDAS ST. PAVEMENT

Mayor Smith Intends to Call a Meeting—Charles Wright, Sr., Injured.

Toronto Junction, Nov. 15.—Mayor Smith has in his possession a rough draft of the estimate for brick paving Dundas-street. The total cost will be \$56,400. The distance to be paved from Humboldt-avenue to St. John's Church will be in the neighborhood of 5000 feet, and 40 feet wide, or 22,222 square yards. The scheme is on a basis of the Dundas-street property owners paying half the cost and the town as a whole assuming the other half. The mayor intends to call a public meeting to have the matter discussed.
