





Thousands of People Made Homeless and


Thousands of Cattle Drowned. Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 12.—Late Si-berian papers report great floods in Siberia, by which thousands have been rendered homeless and desti-tute. The Siphoon, Moor, Santa Chasa and Inman Rivers are all out of their banks, and the plains for hundreds of miles are covered by a great lake, the water in some cases being 26 feet deep. Th Siberian Railway has been flooded for a distance of 120 versis from Inman, the terminus of the road, and many large washouts are reported many large washouts are repor elsewhere.
