Starvation, Call for Help.

Guantanamo Bay, July 26.—The following pitiful appeal has been addressed by the starving people of Cienfuegos to Rear Admiral Sampson: Hon. Sir,—The Cubans, old men, women and children, resident in the town of Cienfuegos and this neighborhood, are all dying of hunger. The young men are all in the field with the American troops and have not shoes, neither food. All the provisions in this town are in the hands of the Spaniards. Cubans cannot obtain a piece of bread, as it is necessary to send everything to the field. The Weyler system is in his way. The situation is terrible, If you, honorable sir, do not come quick with your squadron in our help and take possession of this town we shall be lost. We beg you to precipitate your operations. About 5000 old men, women and children shall die of hunger in this poor town. Some of these old men have four or five sons fighting for his freedom. This is our situation, horrible situation. If the great people of the United States do not come quick in our help we are lost. For God's sake come quick. Signed) Some Cubans."

—There are 200 yellow fever cases here and at the front to-day. There will be 1000 if we are here two weeks longer.

This was the prediction made by Dr. Senn, the Government yellow fever expert, who, with Dr. Guiteras, is looking after the health of the army in that particular line.

The bolt of yellow fever has failen out of an apparently clear sky. Three cases were discovered four days ago. There were '20 the next night. Now there are over 200. Dr. Senn's estimate of 1000 in two weeks seems conservative in the face of these figures.
