HEARD FROM AT THE FALLS. CHICAGO TO EUROPE DIRECT.

Man Believed to be Father Joly, Missing Priest of St. Emile, Left Baggage There.

HIS NAME FOUND ON A BOTTLE BIG STEAMER NORTHWESTERN

Some further particulars as to the movements of the man who registered at the Arlington Hotel on March 15 as William Conley of New York confirm the belief that he is no other than Rev. Father Joly, parish priest of St. Emile, Joliet County, Quebec, who disappeared in November last from that village and was supposed to have been murdered. The World told yesterday of Dr. B. L. Hordan treating a sick man at the Arlington Hotel, and of his entertaining parish priest.

It transpires that Officer McKenzie of the Niagara Frontier Police Force was in Toronto recently, trying to locate the owner of some baggage that was left at the Niagara Falls by a passenger, who went there from Toronto. Among the baggage was found an empty bottle, with the label of Gibbard's drug store for the Arlington Hotel patient.

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At the Arlington Hotel it was stated that the sick priest was about 40 years of age, and that when he recovered from his "illness" he was an agreeable sort of fellow. Information has been received that a priest stayed part of a day at the Walker House, and when he left there it was thought he was going to the St. Emile Institute on Lake Street. He left the Arlington on March 20, after making enquiries as to the departure of trains for Niagara Falls and New York.

JOHN BROWN'S ROOM OPENED.

Apartment Occupied Formerly by the Queen's Scotch Servant to be Made a Billiard Room.

London, April 24.—The apartment formerly occupied by John Brown in Windsor Castle, which had been closed for 18 years, has been reopened, and will be redecorated and converted into a billiard room. The late Queen Victoria had a passion for shag and the room in which her favorites dined. When Brown died in the room, placing a table on the wall in his room, inaugurating his death and commemorating his virtues, and then had the room locked.

EVIDENCE IN THE COOK CHARGES DISSECTED BY THE LAWYERS

Mr. Marsh Argued That a Good Case Against Sir Richard. With the Premier Not Exempt—Mr. Blake Abused Mr. Cook and Consigned Him to Infamy.

Ottawa, April 24.—(Special.)—In his address to the Senate Committee on the Cook charges this afternoon Mr. A. H. Marsh, having dealt with the evidence, which he said was not responsible for the acts of the agent, Sir Richard did set forth a sort of particular appointment, and Sir Richard acted through him. He had control of the matter, and he had proved Mr. Cook's case, against Sir Richard, then Sir Wilfrid Laurier is equally culpable along with him. It is not in the mind of the public that it will not do for the pious member of a firm to attempt to wash the hands of a wicked partner, and I submit that in this case Sir Richard Cartwright is not out in the position of a wicked partner who has the whole of the opprobrium loaded upon him.

A Perfectly Clear Case.

It is perfectly clear, from the evidence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself, that Sir Richard Cartwright is in the mire. With regard to the aspect of the whole matter, I desire to call attention to the way in which the Premier has put Mr. Smith, under his own name of plume of a Bylander, in the Farmer's Sun, and I desire to point out that Sir Richard Cartwright adopted his statement as a part of my argument. He says: "The Premier would have a vacancy there. Vacancies were happening all the time, and whether a vacancy existed at a particular date has nothing to do with it. If there was a vacancy there was always a hope for it. Hon. Mr. Dandurand: I could be discharged."

MR. BLAKE'S ARGUMENT.

He Particularly Regrets That the Premier Was Brought In.

At the evening sitting of the committee Mr. Blake followed for the defence. He regretted that Mr. Marsh had reflected on Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and pointed out that Mr. Cook said he did not make a charge against the Premier. Besides, Mr. Blake had said there was nothing to justify calling on Sir Wilfrid to give evidence. He said that the Premier is coming to be held in honor by the whole Dominion, and should not be lightly assailed, and that there is evidence against him of wrongdoing.

He warned the officers to not land, but they persisted and he fired three shots, one passing through Terry's heart. Cole was arrested.
