London, Jan. 14.-The Vienna correspondent of the Standard says: A circular has been issued to the powers from St. Petersburg, stating that the czar's magnanimous idea having met with general approbation, the time had arrived to submit to the cabinets a programme to be considered at the proposed conference, which must be regarded as nothing more than a basis for the deliberations. I understand this programme does not mention disarmament. It restricts itself to proposing a limitation of the growth of armaments. especially with respect to new inventions. It does not suggest any particular place for meeting, but proposes the choice of a town other than one of the capitals of the great powers.

FRENCH STORY OF A NEW COM-PACT. The Paris correspondent of the Lon-

don Morning Post says: According to news from St. Petersburg, from a source usually trustworthy, a treaty of aliance between Russia and Afghanistan was signed on Jan. 3, despite the strenuous opposition of Great Britain, whose representative, it is reported, offered the ameer money and troops, with a view to getting him to enter upon

hostilities with Russia. According to the same source of information, the ameer a few days be-fore has issued a proclamation assuring the Afghans of the czar's friendly disposition, and of the benefits likely to result form Russia building the Kushk Railway, saying: "Let us not listen, then, to certain evil-disposed foreigners, who are in the habit of uttering calumnies, but let us be friends of the Russians, as we are of their

empire.'

SAGASTA'S PROGRAMME. Madrid, Jan. 14.-Premier Sagasta will convene the cortes for Jan. 25 or Jan. 30, and will immediately demand a ratification of the peace treaty. Spain has again reminded the Washington Government of the undertaking on the part of the United States peace com missioners with regard to the Spanish

prisoners in the hands of the Filipinos, and has asked a prompt reply. The mayor and entire city council of Porto Rico have resigned, owing to the fact that they are incapable of raising sufficient funds under the present tariffs, and also because they are not satisfied with the so-called abrupt com-mands of the military government, but

there is no ill-feeling.

JAPAN AND CHINA. London, Jan. 14.—The Standard prints the following from Kobe, Japan: Rear-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford arrived here today, and was received with every mark of respect by the Japanese officials. A deputation, representing the British colony, waited upon him with an address of welcome, and in the course of his reply he reverted to his scheme for an alliance between Great Britain, the United States, Germany and Japan to maintain the "open door"

in China as the best basis for China's integrity. Advices from the Orient state that the Japanese Government has given an order for the construction of another large battleship, in addition to the Asahi Shikishima and Hatsuse, now be-

C. Smith, D. D. Ranlett, C. M. Hays, Chas. Perry, John G. McCullough, W. S. Webb, Ezra H. Baker and Samuel E. Kilner, who organize as the Central Vermont Railway Company. The charter further provides that a majority of the direcors of the reorganized road must be residents of Vermont, and the clerk and treasurer of the company must be residents of the United States. The first meeting of the inconporators named above will be held in St. Albans after the roads and leases of the Central Vermont system have been sold under the decree of the circuit court of the United States for the district of Vermont, when the incorporators will elect
