WOOLEN GOODS DECREASED

The Biggest Advance Is in Smelting,
Leaping From Seven Millions to
Twenty-eight Millions.

Ottawa, June 17. — The census and statistics department has issued another bulletin giving the details of the manufactured products in Canada for the calendar years 1900 and 1905, according to the census of 1901 and 1906. The total value is placed at \$715,035,956 for 1906, compared with \$481,053,375 for 1901. Some of the leading items are as follows:

It will be noticed that there is a decrease of over one million and one quarters in woollen goods through British competition. Of the manufactures not mentioned above, wire fencing is four times greater. Wire has more than doubled, malt liquors from six to eight millions, iron and steel from six to nine millions, hosiery and knit goods from three to six million, furniture from six to eight millions, foundry and machinery from fifteen to twenty-four millions, axes and tools from one million to two and three-quarter millions. Boilers and engines show a decrease from \$4,600,000 to \$3,400,000. Men's custom clothing shows decrease of from eight to six millions, while women's factory clothing have increased three millions and a half. Smelting has increased from seven millions to over twenty-eight millions.

SLAYS WIFE AND SELF.
BABIES FIND BODIESDetroit Carpenter Cuts His Wife's
Throat and Commits Suicide.

Detroit, Mich., June 17. — William Roulo, a carpenter, aged 35 years, cut his wife's throat last night in their home at 637 Beaudry avenue, and then slashed his own throat with the same razor. Both died where they fell, in a bedroom, where their two children were sleeping. Roulo and his wife Mary had quarrelled bitterly during the past six months, and Mrs. Roulo had applied for a divorce. When the two children, aged 7 and 5 years, awakened this morning, they found the bodies on the floor and called the neighbors.

CZAR SIGNS DISSOLUTION UKASE;
PUTS AN END TO SECOND DUMAIssues a Manifesto Accusing the
Parliament of Disloyal
Acts.

St. Petersburg, June 15. — Emperor Nicholas affixed his signature this morning to an imperial ukase abolishing the Duma and ordering that the election of members to its successor, which was to meet October 14, was to be held under the new election law, which provides against the "submergence of the educated classes by the uneducated masses."

This act constitutes a virtual coup d'etat and overrides the specific provisions of the fundamental laws of the realm, solemnly proclaimed by his majesty on the eve of the convocation of the first Duma, which declared that the electoral law could never be changed without the consent of parliament itself.

The ukase is accompanied by a manifesto setting forth the motives which led the Emperor to dissolve the Duma. His majesty adverts to the Duma's rejection of temporary laws, its refusal to condemn terrorism, the delay in ratifying the budget, the open revolutionary spirit of a large portion of its members, the abuse of the right of interpellation, and finally, the failure to pass the budget.

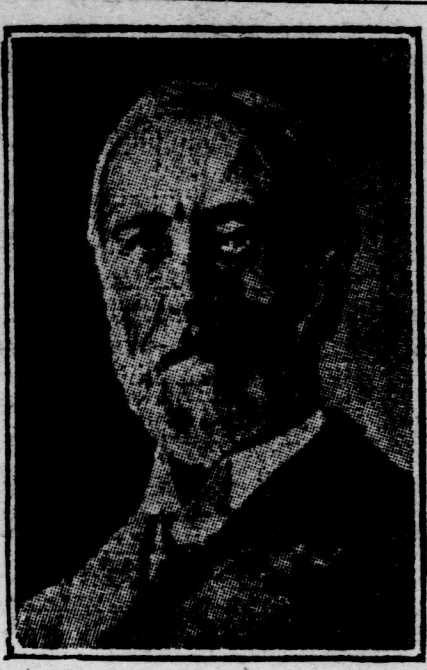

Stratford, June 16.—Noah Hill, a workman employed at the gas works, met a tragic death here on Saturday night, and Harry Lockyer is held pending the inquest and inquiry into the matter. It is alleged that while intoxicated the two men engaged in a fight, resulting in the dislocation of Hill's neck and his instant death.

It is said the pair decided to settle a difference of opinion by a resort to fist-fighting, the quarrel originating while Hill and Lockyer were drinking at a local bar. There were several witnesses of the fatal fight, and according to one of them the second blow struck caught Hill fairly in the neck, stretching him out senseless. Lockyer had just returned from attending the military training camp at London. Late Saturday night Lockyer was arraigned before Magistrate Sloane and pleaded not guilty to the charge of having caused Hill's death. He claims that Hill charged him, and that he (Lockyer) dodged, thus causing Hill to fall with terrific force, thus breaking his neck. An inquest will be held today.

The New Triple Alliance

Paris, June 17.—Speaking yesterday of the new Franco-Spanish and British-Spanish treaties, the signature of which virtually creates a new triple alliance, M. Pichon, minister of foreign affairs, said:

"Such arrangements are the best guarantee of peace that can be conceived. Our agreement with Spain is purely pacific. It accords with the interests as well as the sympathies of both nations. The negotiations for this safeguarding of the common interests of the two countries have been communicated to the other powers, with explanations as to its scope. Its intent is purely pacific, the object being to assure the status quo of that region, which could not be altered without injury to the two contracting signatories and the security of the communications of the respective outlying territories, which is especially important in the case of our possessions in Africa, and on both the Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts."

TRAGIC DEATH OF
FORMER LONDONERMr. E. R. Minihinnick Drowned
at Cleveland While on Fish-
ing Excursion.

Word was received in this city yesterday of the death by drowning in Cleveland, Ohio, of Mr. Edward R. Minihinnick, son of the late John R. Minihinnick, of Grand avenue, and cousin of Mr. J. R. Minihinnick, of the Carling Brewing and Malt Company.

The dispatch states that Mr. Minihinnick, who resides at 4,023 Gladstone avenue, Cleveland, was drowned on Saturday afternoon while fishing. He was with two companions in a boat, and while drawing anchor the shallow craft was upset.

The other two men saved their lives by clinging to the boat, but Mr. Minihinnick sank in the full view of hundreds of people on the shore and in boats, none of whom offered the drowning man assistance.

Up till yesterday afternoon the body had not been recovered.

Mrs. Minihinnick, of Grand avenue, accompanied by her son, Harry Minihinnick, and her daughter, Miss Gertie, left at eight o'clock last night for Cleveland. It is understood the funeral will take place in that city, where the wife and daughter of Mr. Minihinnick are buried, they having died some years ago.

The late Mr. E. R. Minihinnick was until eight or ten years ago a resident of London, and was with his father in the Empire Oil Company, of East London. He then went to Toronto where he remained for some time, finally going to Cleveland. In the latter city he had been very successful in a business way.

He was home at the time of his father's death a year ago last winter.

TORPEDOED HIS CUTTER

Commander of the Black Sea Fleet Has
a Narrow Escape.

Sebastopol, June 17.—Rear Admiral Wren, in command of the Black Sea fleet was cruising in a steam cutter yesterday while a torpedo boat in command of Lieut. Ruzhik was practicing firing whiteheads in the spacious inner bay. When the admiral's cutter was at short range the torpedo boat suddenly changed her position and fired a blank whitehead directly at the cutter, penetrating the latter's water tank. Only the promptitude of the crew in beaching the cutter in a sinking condition saved the admiral's life. Lieut. Ruzhik explained that the whitehead was fired through an accident, but he and three junior lieutenants, who were sullen and refused to salute the admiral, were degraded, and, as the result of later evidence, were arrested on the charge of attempting to sink the cutter.

CABINET BACKS BOND.

St. Johns, Nfld., June 15.—The colonial cabinet today voted to uphold Premier Bond in protesting against a sacrifice of Newfoundland's interests by the Imperial Government in the fisheries negotiations. The situation is regarded here as rather serious.

TWO-SCORE CHINESE IN THE TOILS
CAUGHT IN ALLEGED GAMBLING DENPolice Make Sunday Night Raid
on Dundas Street
"Laundry."

An alleged gambling den at the Quong Wing laundry, on Dundas street, between Clarence and Wellington, was raided by the city police at 11 o'clock last night. Between 20 and 30 Chinamen—nearly every member of the local colony—were locked up in the Carling street police station. The raid was the most extensive ever conducted in this city, and will, if the charges against the Celestials are proven, clean out what is alleged to have been a big gambling institution.

Police Were Suspicious.

Although the raid came as a big surprise to the Chinamen, it was not a surprise to the police. For many months there have been large gatherings of Chinamen at the rear of the Quong Wing laundry, and although the Chinamen always declared that these gatherings were simply meetings of the Chinese Empire Reform Association, the police were suspicious and had been watching the place closely.

Last night, from an early hour in the evening, Celestials from every part of the city were seen hurrying into the Quong Wing apartments, all torped up in their Sunday rags, just like the "Mellon" man. Sgt. Birrell, assisted by Police Constables Down, Smith and Hill, organized a watch party, and from nearby doorways kept tab on the "washee shop." As the evening advanced still more "Chinks" gathered, coming in small crowds, eagerly chattering in their native tongue. Whether it was a reform meeting or game of "fan tan," the constables could not learn from the outward signs of the place, but one thing was sure, and that was that some (Continued on Page Nine)

The Russian minister at The Hague, however, gave warning of the plot. The necessary measures for safeguarding the lives of the members have already been taken.

BOOTH'S LAST GOOD-
BYE TO THE DOMINIONImpressive Scene as Salvation Army
Chief Sails Away.

Montreal, June 17. — Gen. Booth, of the Salvation Army, accompanied by Brigadier Cox, Commissioner Nicol and Col. Higgins, chief executive of his staff, sailed from Quebec on the R. M. S. Empress of Ireland on Friday last. The scene was most impressive. The wonderful old man, whose name for so many years has been associated with all works for the benefit of mankind, took a position at the rail, and as the ship left the dock uttered a few impressive words of farewell to Canada, with his blessing. A very excellent band played the ship out of sight.

HAYWOOD WITNESS DIES

Passes Away Shortly Before Being
Summoned to Boise.

Canon City, Col., June 17. — Charles W. King, an important witness for the defense in the Haywood trial at Boise, died from neuralgia of the heart yesterday. Bloodhounds belonging to King were used in tracking after the dynamiting of the Independence depot. An hour after his death a telegram came addressed to King, summoning him to Boise.

THE COULTMAN CASE

Council To Decide It on Monday Next
at Toronto.

The case of Rev. D. M. Coultman, formerly pastor of the Baptist Church at St. Catharines, will be finally decided at Toronto on Monday next.

Mr. Coultman has been charged with conduct unbecoming a minister, and he has been notified personally to attend the meeting of the council which has been hearing evidence and offer a defense.

Mrs. Coultman, who is now living with her relatives in Quebec, has not appeared before the council, but she has been examined by a committee from that body.

A HOT RETORT.

Rochester, N. Y., June 17.—Big Ed. Kelly, of Boston, who on Saturday was convicted of second-degree murder, for the killing of Edward Pullman, of Sudas, was today sentenced to Auburn Prison for the rest of his life by Justice Sutherland in supreme court. When asked if he had anything to say by way of sentence should not be passed upon him, Kelly replied that there was. He said he had been convicted by perjured testimony, and that the judge had acted as the thirteenth juror.

CONDUCTOR'S STORY
OF TRAIN WRECKSpecial Running 35 Miles an
Hour When Derailed.

COOLNESS OF ARMY OFFICERS

Prevented Panic Among the Passen-
gers—Broken Axle Cause of the
Accident.

John Fraumi, 131 Queen's avenue, hand cut.

John Everingham, Ridgeway, knee cut.

John McCallum, West Lorne, head cut.

C. J. Peckham, Cowell Postoffice, near Dutton, side hurt.

The above is the casualty list of the accident on the Pere Marquette Saturday, whereby the Salvation Army excursion train was derailed, and a delay of an hour was caused in making of the trip to Detroit.

None of the persons mentioned above sustained any serious injury. Fraumi was standing on the platform when the cars began pounding over the ties and his finger was cut when he jumped into the ditch.

Everingham cut his leg by jumping, but McCallum's head was hurt by being thrown against something in the car. Peckham was injured in a similar manner.

Conductor Burling Bennett, of No. 72 Hamilton road, city, was in charge of the train, and he had with him brakeman David Gillet, of Grey street, London, and C. McFarlane, of St. Thomas, Engineer Barney McAttee, and Fireman Ard, both of St. Thomas, were on the engine.

Conductor Bennett's Story.

Mr. Bennett, when seen by The Advertiser, stated that the train was running about 35 miles an hour and was about a mile west of Glenwood, when the accident occurred. Glenwood is about 55 miles east of Windsor. He was in the last coach and was suddenly alarmed by a swaying of the train from side to side, followed by a pounding of the wheels over the ties.

The people in the coach, many of them ladies, became somewhat alarmed, but thanks to the coolness of the officers of the army, there was no panic whatever.

"I never saw people so cool as the Salvation Army officers," Mr. Bennett said to the reporter. "It does me good to think of the way they acted. When the cars stopped and I saw that all was right in the last car, I ran along and jumped into a coach near the front."

"The moment I entered the door, an officer cried, 'It's all right, conductor, we're all right here.'"

It was the same in every car. The officers were in complete control of their people, and there was no excitement.

An Impressive Incident.

"Then, when all had left the coaches, the officers and members of the army with two bands from London and St. Thomas, opened a farm gate which led into a field and there on the green sward, they knelt and offered up prayer, followed by a hymn sung with such sincerity that the men at work on the wrecked train paused to listen. It was the most impressive incident of the wreck, and I believe of my life. It was so very beautiful that I shall never forget it."

Fast Run With Doctor.

As soon as the regular train came along the engine was unhooked and sent up to Merlin, where Dr. Bell was found and brought back as fast as the locomotive could run. It was found, however, that no one had been seriously hurt.

The passengers, all but three, were then placed on the regular from London. (Continued on Page Three.)

A BLACK HAND OUTRAGE.

Chicago, June 17.—A dynamite explosion yesterday partially wrecked Cosimo Bruscatto's flat building, 64 Milton avenue, and spread terror throughout that section of "Little Italy." Forty-five persons were asleep in the apartments at that time, but all escaped injury. The outrage is laid to the "Black Hand" in furtherance of a plot to extort money from Bruscatto.

GOVERNMENT AND RAILWAYS.

Chicago, June 17.—Of railroad presidents to whom the Record-Herald addressed a request for their opinion on governmental control of the physical properties of the railroads of the country as proposed by President Roosevelt in his Decoration Day speech at Indianapolis, eight have replied opposing the idea, one qualified favoring it, another was indifferent. Three courteously declined to express an opinion.

DRY AT LAST.

Ste. Genevieve, Mo., June 17.—The saloons yesterday closed their doors, and for the first time in 112 years the town was "dry." The action was taken on the advice of the prosecuting attorney. Ste. Genevieve was founded in 1735, and since its foundation drinking places have never been closed.
