AN ANTIDOTE FOR BIGOTRY.

ANADA's gravest problem since confeder... ance. For years before the war certain sections all nowadays. of the English and French press were constantly earling at one another. The cheapest brand of unalism is that which through bordering on the stupid mob. They follow where intolerance leads down through all the ages. They manifest the spirit that crucified Christ, that burned martyrs at the stake, that threw women into ponds to drown. Their Moloch is a god of blind prejudice, and they find false priests everywhere to lead them down the paths of hate and destruc-

We have seen this spirit of enmity fostered in Ontario by several vicious newspapers that are best labelled assassins of national unity. They have their counterparts in Quebec. They have developed false leaders, and between the two forces of intolerance has grown a blind desire to strike, an evil passion to slaughter, the objects of hatred. When rage is enthroned reason is an outcast. Out of the bitterness engendered by the murderers of good feeling and interprovincial amity has come the situation in Quebec. The bullets that struck the bodies of soldiers and civilians in Quebec city recently were molded long ago in the minds of the bigots. The war situation caused these destructive missiles to be thrown earlier than would have been the case without the war, but the flames for the forge were kindled long ago.

In the face of this warfare of two extremsts, it is good to observe the effort made by Hon. Frank Carrel, owner of the Quebec Telegraph, to bring about a better understanding. The Telegraph has just issued a special edition dedicated to "unity and confederation." The first page shows a beautiful grouping of the figures of the provinces, vestal maidens gathered at the seat of Quebec, their arms filled with rich grains and fruits, while doves circle above them. The Union Jack flies over the scene, while in

the background looms the great Quebec bridge, arching over the front gateway of the nation. On the cover page appears the following:

The cementing of the bonds and ties of all peoples of this vast dominion of ours is of more moment than any other single phase of unity.

With this sentiment as a keynote, the edition proceeds with the sounding of a call for harmonous working together, "With the election over," goes on the appeal, "the people of Canada, irrespective of race or creed or politics, can now throw themselves whole-heartedly into winning the war and building up the Greater Canada of the future.'

Sir Lomer Gouin, whose recent speech in the Quebec Legislature, in which he eloquently declared for the perpetuation of confederation, sends a message commending the aims of the edition, devoutly calling upon the people of the province to observe their duty in the attainment of the desired condition. 
