COUNCIL REFUSES DEBENTURE ISSUE FOR HYDRO SHOP

Proposition Not Included in City of London Bill.

WILL COMPLETE AUDIT

Enforcement of Militia Act To Be Further Considered.

The council last evening refused the request of the utilities commission for \$50,000 in debentures to complete the hydro shop. The issue will not be included in the city of London bill, and there seems to be no possibility of the commission getting the money this year.

Controller E. S. Little was the only member of the council supporting the motion. He pointed out that the building was needed; that it meant a development in the hydro enterprise; that it would be a step towards the completion of the hydro shop in the city hall, the shop could be sold for at least as much as it cost.

Ald. Moorhead wanted the structure built out of surplus. He thought there was sufficient for the purpose. He kept work and money until the soldiers returned, said Controller Shaw.

Will Complete Audit. The audit muddle was finally straightened out, and Andrew Dale and Arch Sereton were finally authorized to complete the audit of the books for 1916, for which they will receive \$500 and to audit the books for 1917, for which they will receive \$450. This will include all clerical assistance, etc., but they will be allowed to retain their private practice. This order will mean a saving of about \$1,800. If P. G. Jewell is consulted by heads of departments or by the utilities commission, the city or the commission, as the case may be, will pay the cost.

Ald. Copp and Ald. Cunningham were in favor of amending the bylaws governing poolrooms in order that they be allowed to run only four days a week, instead of six, as at the present time. The matter was referred to No. 1 committee.

Would Amend Act. A deputation from the Mothers' Clubs from the city, headed by Mrs. Harry Winnett, protested against the desired amendments to the motor vehicle act as proposed by the Safety League, by which pedestrians were to keep only to crossings when going from one side of the street to the other. They declared that this would be a grievous burden to them, as it was impossible to keep children from crossing the streets in the middle of blocks. It would place the onus for accidents on the pedestrian, which was unfair. They objected to the proposal to increase the speed limit from 15 to 20 miles for automobiles. The matter will be taken up by No. 2 committee at once, and a recommendation presented to the council at the next meeting.

It was decided to reject the stalls in the basement of the market house. Some time ago the council voted to give this portion of the building over to the butter and eggs dealers, who came from the country, but the council last night decided that this was unwise.

Further Consideration. The resolution passed by several councils, to the effect that the militia act be put into force in Canada, was sent back for further consideration on the motion of Ald. Ashplant. He would not support any motion that did not provide for a conscription of wealth as well as men. The council agreed to send the matter to the committee on Beddome & Brown were given the

LONDON MAY LOSE PART OF M'CLARY'S UNLESS GAS COMES

Letter From Firm Tells of Urgent Need of Fuel.

DISTRIBUTION PLANNED

Ratepayers To Vote on Proposal to Raise Money for System.

That a portion of the McClary Manufacturing Company's plant would have to be moved out of London, if natural gas is not furnished within a reasonable time, was the somewhat startling announcement made to the council last evening by Lieut.-Col. W. M. Garthshore, in a letter to that body. The council did not see fit to grant the request to allow McClary's to connect at its own expense with the Southern Ontario Gas Company's main just outside the city. City Solicitor Meredith stated that it would be impossible to give the company a franchise for a period exceeding one year, and that at the expiration of the time the matter would have to be voted on.

The council did pass a resolution to the effect that the utilities commission be empowered to distribute natural gas. This will be referred to the City of London bill. In the meantime the McClary Company was said over until tenders for natural gas are received.

Will Take a Vote. It developed, however, that the utilities commission, in case the Legislature does give it power to distribute natural gas, will have to have a vote of the people to raise the necessary money. This vote cannot be taken save at a regular municipal election, which is next January. In the meantime, the McClary Company will be without natural gas, and London is in danger of losing one of the biggest industries within its limits. The company has received flattering offers to go elsewhere, and is considering them.

Lieut.-Col. Garthshore explained at some length the position of the company, and it is a most reasonable one. It is not our intention that anything in this subject should be construed as a desire on the part of this company to obtain an exclusive franchise or a perpetual supply of natural gas from any one source," said Col. Garthshore.

Want a Supply. "Our sole intention was to facilitate at the earliest possible moment a supply of natural gas for manufacturing purposes, recognizing the delay that authorities undertook to introduce it. We would be perfectly satisfied to obtain this supply from any source that you may determine, and can only repeat that the matter is extremely urgent and should be adopted with the least possible delay. For several years a supply of several million feet of gas has been passing our doors. It would be just as reasonable that the railway trains should carry coal past London as that this natural fuel should not be utilized. The scarcity of fuel, oil and coal, and the increasing cost of same, is such that natural gas will have to be brought to the plant or a portion of the plant moved to the natural gas."

Sidesteps All Efforts To Find Out About Hospital.

Controller Shaw hinted that Mayor Stevenson destroyed the shorthand notes made in City Clerk Baker's office. This Mayor Stevenson denied, and challenged Dr. Shaw to produce the notes or the letter.

"Your friend, Flanagan, heard me talking about the matter, and he told you to destroy the notes," declared Controller Shaw. "I want to know who your stenographer is. I want to know who wrote the letter for you."

"If the letter is in Ottawa, you can get it," retorted the mayor. I told you to get it."

The mayor promised to answer Ald. Copp's question in due time.

FACILITATES CASH SENDING TO FRONT

The Canadian Bank of Commerce Has Supply of New Notes on the Bank of France.

Through the enterprise of the local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the sending of money to soldiers at the front has been greatly facilitated. The bank has secured a supply of Bank of France 5-franc notes, which it is selling at the rate of 6 francs for 35 cents.

These notes are actual cash, and are consequently accepted cash value anywhere in France, which makes their use preferable to postal money orders and other vouchers, the cashing of which in France entails formality.

The notes having relatives or friends at the front will find this means of sending money very convenient, and will doubtless take full advantage of it instead of utilizing more cumbersome methods.

Solos, which were rendered by J. Foster, Mrs. Fry, Mrs. Seef and Miss Lola Graham were greatly enjoyed.

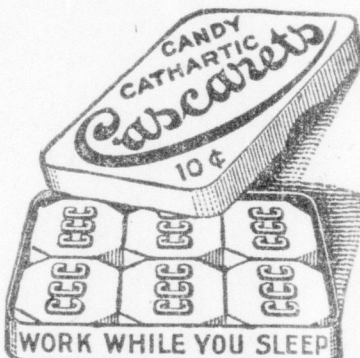
A reading by Miss Ethel Tribe and a drill under the direction of H. N. Watson, made up a fine program.

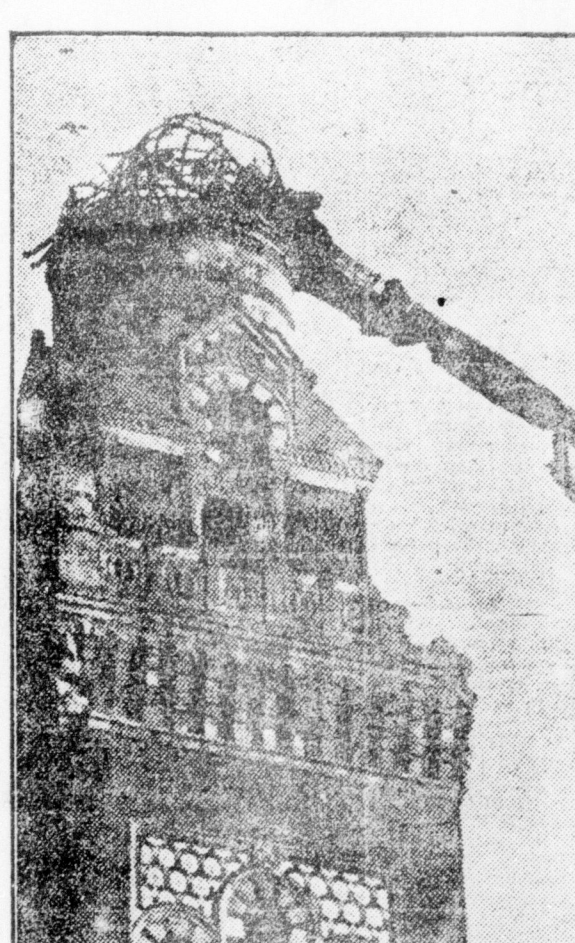
