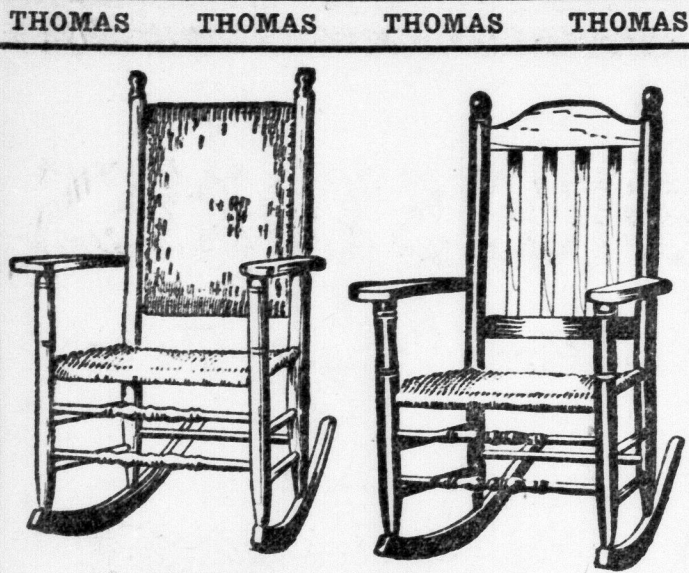


MOOSE SAW HIT BY

FULLY DISCUSSEDS. H. Hammond Gives His
Opinion On the Matter Now
Before City Council.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
There is a movement in the city to exhumate a carcass, known as the plumbing bylaw. Having once again brought it into the light of day it was found to be so decomposed that a renovation was necessary, and even amputation in some instances. But, in the minds of some of the plumbers who are endeavoring to foist this costly thing on the citizens of London, this city has all at once become a very unhealthy place to live, and to alter these insanitary conditions, it is supposed that we need a plumbing inspector and a revised bylaw.

As I said before this old carcass of a bylaw has been dug up and revised and found so impracticable and obsolete, so full of red tape, that it was rescinded by our council, and now everyone concerned is falling over themselves to frame this "humpty-dumpty" together again. Mind you, Mr. Editor, all this patching down and remodeling will not alter the cost to the citizens while we as citizens encourage these unnecessary appendages. Am I to believe that these plumbers care so much for the poor hardworking man that they are pushing this thing so? No, sir, I do not believe it is so. "Why not?"—Just one instance. A plumber of some experience, a member of the committee Monday evening, had actually proposed a check valve to be placed in every water line to protect the water meter in case of overhauling the range boiler. And that is the way it goes; any kind of tom fool theory at the expense of practice. I make bold to say that London with its competent plumbers and educated citizens, is a healthy city, and there are few people today who do not know a good job when they see it, and more, they know what they want before they begin. If the people of London only knew what they have got to pay for work when this new bylaw comes into effect they would rave. The expenses added to any job will be 25 per cent. Plumbers will not purchase and maintain the necessary machine paraphernalia for testing, coupled with the extra time and delays, unless they include the charges to the consumer. Then the fee to conduct a plumbing business is \$25. Who pays it? I say, who pays it? Who pays the inspector? In adopting this bylaw and Inspectorship are we at the limit of our expenses? Are we sure this thing will cost us no more? Or is it possible that the whole thing is in its infancy? I tell you, sir, that this is but the thin edge of the wedge, for no plumbing inspector is going to work along at the present salary these days of high cost, and when things get busy you will find

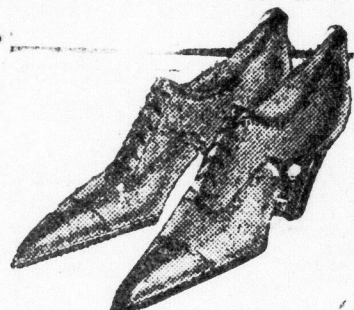

he will need an assistant, maybe some conveyance, maybe lots of other things, and all these things will be done without asking the inspector (I know you did not select the present one), and have a nickel-plated bylaw, now proceed to have your plumbing installed. You have it inspected and passed upon as O. K. Tell me, sir, will your job remain, I say remain, perfect any longer because you have it inspected? Fifty per cent of the inspected work would not stand the same test a month later on account of conditions outside of workmanship.

Now if the work will not hold up to the same severe test in a month later, who is to know it? It seems it would be necessary to conduct these tests periodically in order to maintain the original efficiency. Everyone is aware that in the winter the ice cold air, drawing up a solid stack, has an action upon the metals that compose the stack so when the hot water is turned into the pipes an opposite action takes place. The bathroom installer, during the past seven years are upon the whole a benefit to the public and a credit to the trade. You may add all you wish to them in the way of ventilation, but you will only get a bath from a bathtub at any time, and a good wash from a basin at any time. An automobile that has a self-starter, electric lights, a mahogany dash board and plush seats is no more to be trusted than the butcher's box car when both are stalled. They both need the service of a mechanic, but the box car of the butcher is fixed more easily on account of its simplicity. So it is with your plumbing; the less appendages the better and the less cost. Taxes are high enough at present without adding these things. Someone may say "Don't you think that certain conditions need improving?" That may be so. We have health inspectors, who when they see a wet, sodden state of

affairs around a closet bowl, caused by the perishing of the rubber gasket, will have the bowl taken out and reset with proper material. In such a case under the present bylaw it would cost you more to test the job than to renew the bowl. When it comes to large buildings in the city, they are mostly supervised by an architect who always takes care that complicated plumbing is well ventilated. But we do not need it in our small homes. How many deaths are recorded in London directly through unventilated plumbing? It is a wonder any of us are alive today if this be true. And one more thing in closing, London does not have to have these things if

the citizens do not want them. Why should we everlastingly want to be like some other town? Let's strike out for ourselves without precedent and do things the way we are convinced is good for all, rather than do things because other cities do so.

The builders and contractors have no use for the new bylaw, the majority of the plumbers are not in favor of it, and it has not the approval of the property-owning citizens. So who wants it?

TRANSIENT TRADERS

Special Committee May Take Up Matter of Fees.

A special committee may be appointed by the city council to take up the matter of licenses for transient traders. A change in the bylaw governing the license fee for circuses and menageries has been recommended, and further changes are likely to result from this. The fee for a circus of 50 cars is \$200. For one requiring more than that number of railroad cars the fee jumps suddenly to \$500. This was thought to be too big an increase and it was reduced.

Plumbers are urging that outside plumbing contractors should be charged as transient traders. They point out that if an outsider wishes to sell goods here for a short time, he is charged a fee of \$250. A contracting firm, however, can come in and do thousands of dollars' worth of work without being charged a cent.

The special committee, if appointed, will consider this matter, and may also recommend a lower fee for transient traders.

Demands Caillaux
Be Found Guilty

French Prosecutor Reviews
Ex-Premier's Acts in
Italy.

PARIS, April 15.—Formal demand for a verdict of guilty was made today by Theodore Lescouffe, the public prosecutor, when the treason trial of former Premier Joseph Caillaux was resumed before the Senate sitting as a high

court of justice. M. Lescouffe addressed the court as he began to reinforce the previous testimony regarding the activities of the ex-premier in Italy. It was then that the prosecutor insisted upon a verdict to the effect that M. Caillaux's conduct was traitorous to France. If the demand is fulfilled it will entail a prison sentence of at least five years and banishment.

It is now believed that there will be a verdict about April 24.
