Glasgow, Oct. 26.—A party of archaeologists, who have been searching for some time in the lake of Riga, in Loch Sunart, for prehistoric relics, has discovered what is believed to be a sacred site of a date long before the Christian era. The rock sculptures of the prehistoric leaders of long past ages have been found and the lines of the walls of their homes and temples have been traced. The excavations reveal rows of black circular spots where uprights stood.

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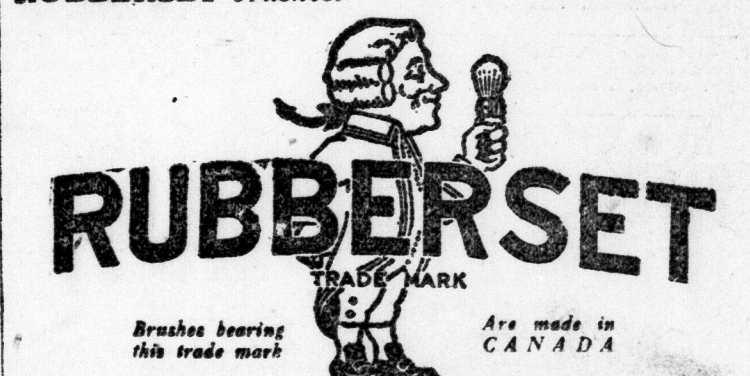


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
