Predicts Aldermen's Defeat.
Rev. Dr. Sowerby Says Anti-Reductionists in Council Will Suffer.
The Rev. A. T. Sowerby of College-street Baptist Church, who was one of the speakers on behalf of the Municipal Association before the city council, when the question of reduction of licenses came up, delivered a stirring address to a crowded audience at the meeting of the Canadian Temperance League in Massey Hall yesterday afternoon.

"Three years ago, in a speech on this platform," said he, "I referred to the action of the city council, and one who was controller then took offence and made an attack on me. He was defeated at the last election. There he lay on the floor, and I, as the speaker, 'Perhaps we cannot defeat in one year all the aldermen who voted against license reduction, but let them understand that their doom is sealed.'"

Dr. Sowerby said that he would rather welcome the seating of the whole 13, for he believed that public indignation would reach such a point, that there would be no mistaking the attitude of the citizens on this question.

He condemned the nasty words in that letter of the resigning license commissioner, and said that he was glad that letter contained. It was not the commissioners' business to interfere and tell the council what they should do.

Fire at Hastings.
