UNION STRIKERS CLASH WITH STRIKE-BREAKERS

Men Sailed Forth From Stove Works at Brantford and Attacked Pickets.

BRANTFORD, April 20.—(Special.)—The strike of the union moulders at the Buck Stove Works is beginning to assume a serious aspect. To-night at the closing hour the strikebreakers sailed forth from the shop in an attack on the union men doing patrol work in that vicinity. George Battye, a striker, was badly used up in the melee, and had to be taken to the hospital. His face was beaten with the butt end of a revolver, and he sustained internal injuries.

The affair to-night was a sequel to some stone-throwing by the union men on the strikebreakers this morning. The latter were on their way to work when they received a fusillade from the trucks of the G.T.R. subway, Clarence-street.

One of the strikebreakers had his back injured, necessitating his removal to the hospital. The situation has become such as to require special police service at the shop. About 150 of the men have been on strike for three weeks with prospects of the struggle being a long one.

DRAGGED FROM A RIG.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the strikers dragged a man from a rig on his way to the shop. Manager Parker and Phillip Buck came out and succeeded in getting the fellow back into a small cart, where a second attack was frustrated. Police action had been taken by Wm. Cook against several of the strikers, whom he recognized.

ITALIANS HELD THE FORT.

Two Italians, Jose and John Belmont, were arrested at Blue Lake this afternoon, where they had been holding forth against the Portland Cement Company, refusing to be dispossessed of a small hill which they occupied. The Italians held the place at revolver's point and threatened to shoot anyone interfering with them.

RUSHED THE SQUATTERS.

Will Hurry Fortifications for New York. NEW YORK, April 20.—(Special.)—Under orders, soldiers to-day seized and ousted squatters from the beach, and rush orders have been received for the construction of new fortifications, which are imperatively needed to protect New York.

Mr. Mayberry was chosen on the second ballot. The vote was as follows: First ballot, Charles Carroll, Norwich, 77; T. R. Mayberry, Ingersoll, 104; Richard Seldon, Ingersoll, 35. Second ballot, Mayberry 143, Carroll 73. Mr. Mayberry was made the unanimous choice of the convention. T. R. Mayberry ran against Sir Richard Cartwright on the independent ticket about 12 years ago and was defeated.



FELL INTO THE FLUME. Terrible Experience of Henry McDonald. SMITH'S FALLS, April 20.—(Special.)—Henry McDonald, an employe of the woolen mill at Burrill's Rapids, a short distance below Smith's Falls, had an experience yesterday that few men live to tell of. He was doing some work at the flume when he fell in and was carried its full length and under the bridge. The water is very high at that point at present, and the force of it almost carried him into the wheel. Just as he reached it, however, the current, as if by a miracle, tossed him to one side and he was carried away in the overflow to a point below the mill, where a fellow workman rescued him.
