**Premier Denies Truth of Story About Blair**

Rises to Deny in Justice to the Memory of the Late Minister of Railways.

OTTAWA, May 1.—Mr. Taylor today brought up the matter of the purchase of five extinguishers at the request of the minister of marine, and the curious fact that the brother of the postmaster-general was prevented from being the Liberal candidate in Ottawa by the fact becoming known that he, also a lawyer, had received a commission of \$3 each on 136 extinguishers sold the government.

It was when Sir Wilfrid was shown the cheques for the commissions that he called Mr. Levesque off. Mr. Taylor wanted to know how it came that the public works department paid Mr. Levesque \$15 for each extinguisher which had been bought by the marine department for \$14 each.

"I am going to run in opposition to this scheme," and the information is that 'the prime minister put his hand in his pocket and pulled out some cheques that a big contractor had paid to Mr. Blair with the latter's name signed on the back of them."

At this point Sir Wilfrid rose and said: "In justice to the memory of Mr. Blair, I must say that there is not a word of truth in that."

"I am glad to hear it," rejoined Mr. Taylor. "I thought it was my duty, however, to mention the matter to the right hon. gentleman."

**LOUGHRIN WAS OFFERED \$8000 TO STAND ASIDE**

Liberal Candidate in Nipissing Tells a Story Anent Cochrane By Election.

NORTH BAY, May 1.—(Special.)—John Loughrin, merchant of Mattawa, was the choice of the Nipissing Liberal convention for the legislative seat to-day. Loughrin sat in the legislature under Premier Ross, resigning to accept the position of registrar of Nipissing. He was dismissed from office by the present administration, and succeeded by Charles Lamarche, ex-M.L.A., who resigned his seat to make room for Frank Cochrane, elevation to the cabinet.

A public meeting following the convention was addressed by Hon. A. G. MacKay, C. A. McCool, M.P., and others.

G. A. McCaughey, local barrister, stated that an agreement had been made by Mr. Cochrane was not opposed at the election, Registrar Loughrin would be kept in his position. A letter from the present minister of mines confirming the agreement was alleged to have been received at the time.

Candidate Loughrin made a sensational charge that he had been offered \$8000 in J. R. Booth's office at Ottawa not to oppose Frank Cochrane in the election. This he refused, but consented to keep out of the way if his position was assured.
