His reply reads as follows :

Dated at Edmonton, February 1st.

"The American-Canadian Oil Company, of Morinville, are said to have struck Dakotas at 2,500 feet depth, and are still boring in the same formation at 2,750 feet. This gentleman, Mr. Frank Smith, has many times made reported for the Canadian Government in this district, and is asknowledged to be an expert in every sense of the word. He does not happen to be an author, with a slight knowledge of geological matters, like Mr. W. A. Fraser. This gentleman was sent by the Dominion Government, on July 19th, of last year, to report on Count von Hammerstein's wells, and upon his return, as appeared in The Mail and Empire of November 4th, this gentleman stated that he considered the district between Edmonton and Fort McMurray would prove to be a rich oil-producing section.. In an interview with this gentleman which was published in the Edmonton Journal, he went on to state a

"One of von Hammerstein's boring outfits has reached a depth of 1,151 feet, and has struck oil several times." (It is from this well that Mr. Smith secured his samples.). "There is little being done at the present time on von Hammerstein's borings, since yon Hammerstein has been paying attention to new borings he has started on the shores of Lesser Slave Lake." Mr. Smith went on to state the indications of oil are certainly exceedingly good, and there is a large quantity of tar sands to be found in the visinity of Fort Melbury, which will prove valuable. "I would not say that the district is to be a second Cobalt, but certainly there is oil, tar and lime in paying quantities."

I have never stated that the California-Alberta Oil Company had oil on their property, but only that there were good indications, and the proceeds of the stock which has been sold, ontside incidental expenses, is being used solely for the purpose of developing the property. No directors, as such, draw any salary and no stock has been sold by the vendors, it all being held in a pool by the treasurer of the Company,
