DOCTORS REPRIMANDED

AT WESTERN HOSPITAL

Action in Connection With Cook

Case Was Breach of That

Institution's Discipline.

According to a statement issued yester-

day, Dr. Wallace H. Cunningham and

Dr. Clifford Gallagher, internes of the

Western Hospital, were reprimanded

by the board of directors of that insti-

tution yesterday for their breach of

hospital discipline, following their

testimony in the Cook inquest, in

which they admitted that they were

negligent.

Mr. Tomlin declared that the case

could not reflect on the hospital, be-

cause it was the duty of the internes

to ascertain the exact cause of the

death of Florence Cook before sign-

ing the index card.

"There was no hint of carelessness

in the treatment of the girl," said

Superintendent Tomlin. "The mistake

was made by Dr. Gallagher, who did

not telephone to Dr. Dawson and make

absolutely sure of the diagnosis be-

fore signing the index card. There

being some uncertainty in the case,

it was reprehensible not to do so,

and a direct breach of hospital disci-

pline."

Has Not Granted License

For Thorncliffe Race Meet

Hon. H. B. Lucas stated yesterday

ment had not granted the Thorncliffe

Racing Association a license for a

race meet which the association pur-
