GERMANS LOST GROUND NEAR DELVILLE WOOD

British Statement Says Artillery Activity Was Severe on Somme Front.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—"Last night as the result of a minor operation" says the British official statement reporting the military operations on the Somme front in France, "we drove the enemy from a portion of a small area intersected with trenches northwest of Delville Wood which he had recaptured on Thursday."

"On the other parts of the line there were no important infantry encounters. During the past 12 hours hostile artillery generally developed greater activity and some fairly severe but intermittent bombardments have been carried out by the enemy who used a large proportion of gas shells."

TRAIN KILLED GALT MAN AT BATTLE CREEK

GALT, Ont., Sept. 2.—Thomas T. Sullivan, a Galt man, was killed this morning by a M. C. R. train at Battle Creek, Mich. He was a traveler, 22 years of age and was single. His mother, brother and sister live here. The body will be brought to Galt for burial.

Desperate efforts are being put forth by the Austro-German forces to hold up the Russian advance on Lemberg. Fighting in the Zlochoff and Halcic regions has developed great intensity and thus far seems to be indecisive. In the Carpathians, the Russians have added to their success by the capture of strong Teuton positions in the Dornavatra region of the Bukovina-Roumanian frontier.

WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

GRECE now practically is under the control and domination of France and Great Britain. Evidently tiring of the uncertainties of King Constantine and his advisers, France and Britain demanded and were given an Sunday absolute control of all posts and telegraphs in Greece, including the wireless. In a note presented to the Greek Government and espionage was made that enemy agents employed in corruption and espionage should immediately leave Greece and not return until the end of hostilities. Greeks who assisted these enemies of the allied have been rounded up. This action, as well as the sending of a fleet to the port of Athens, where martial law was proclaimed on Saturday, was taken by the entente powers in order to protect themselves against their enemies who were working in Greece. A German submarine was sunk off Phalero by the allied fleet on Saturday. Agents of Germany and they all must get out of Greece, and they are unable to get into communication with their home governments, because the allies will not allow them to use the wires.

Great gains are reported for the British and French on the western front. Combined British and French forces have captured the Villages of Forest and Clery-Sur-Somme, and have taken all the German positions between the two villages. The advance was made after an intense artillery bombardment, and more than 2000 prisoners were taken. In the neighborhood of Fleury also the French made gains, capturing 500 prisoners. British troops captured part of Ginchy and the whole of Guillemont.

England has been exposed to the most pretentious air raid in her history and the results prove conclusively that confidence in her system of defenses against aerial invaders is well founded. Saturday night's zeppelin intrusion was participated in by thirteen airships, but only three of the intruders were able to approach the main objective, London, and even they reached the city's outskirts only. One was brought down by anti-aircraft guns and the other two fled before gunfire and were pursued by British

FRENCH ARTILLERY PREPARED THE WAY

Guns Were "Very Active on Somme Front," Paris Reported Yesterday.

PARIS, Sept. 2.—Fighting on the French section of the battlefield in France last night was continued, according to the official statement issued this afternoon by the French War Department. On the Somme front the French artillery was very active, while in the region northeast of Verdun the Germans violently bombarded French positions between Thiaumont, Fleury and Chapire Wood.

"On the Somme front our artillery activity continued during the night. There was no infantry engagement except four couples de main carried out by us on a German trench near Armancourt, which enabled us to bring back some prisoners.
