

# SEEK LEGISLATION FOR TOWN PLANNING

Toronto Convention to Preserve Home Values and Prevention of Slums.

The first provincial town planings and housing conference for Ontario will be held in the council chamber the city hall on Thursday and Friday next, and on the evenings of these days public meetings will be held in St. James' parish hall and the Convocation Hall of the univer-

The meetings will assemble town planning and better housing enthusi-asts from all over the province and resolutions will be passed urging upon the provincial government the desirability of passing town planning legislation that wall bring urban development under orderly control in the interests of pubic health and well-being as well as of civic economy, the preservation of home values, and the prevention of slums.

The mayor will welcome the dele-gates after a formal opening of the conference on Thursday morning, at which the lieutenant-governor will preside. Mrs. Ald. Hamilton will preside at a luncheon at the King Edward Hotel, when the speakers will be Sir Adam Beck, Premier Drury and

Archbishop McNeil.

A special delegation will meet the government on Friday afternoon to present the case for an up-to-date town planning act for Ontario that will bring the province into the front ment of municipal affairs.
