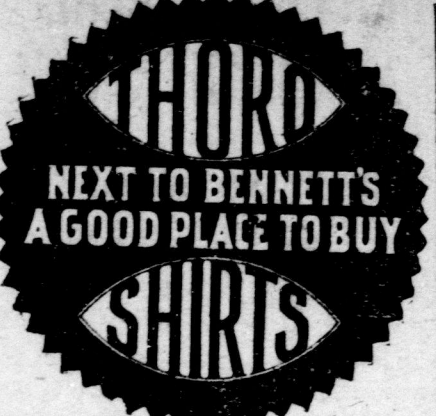

Miss Richardson is accompanying her father, Ven. Archdeacon Richardson, who is a delegate at the Pan-Anglican Congress.

Boys' Branch Banquet.
Over a hundred guests were present at the banquet of the institutional department of the boys' branch of the Askin Street Epworth League held in

the church last night. A most enjoyable evening was spent by all, and Mr. Bert Childs who presided, introduced the following speakers, Messrs. McFarlane, Bert Birks, Charles Switzer, Ray Birks, Rev. A. K. Birks, A. M. Hunt, J. F. Maine, P. Kilbourne, W. Biggs and Misses C. Brenton and E. Brown.

Westminster Services.
Special communion services are being held at the Westminster churches this week. Rev. J. Currie preached at St. Andrew's Church on Wednesday evening, and Rev. J. G. Stuart at First Church on Thursday. The sacrament will be observed on Sunday. Rev. Dr. McCrae will conduct the services. It is expected that every member will be present, and if the weather is fine they will doubtless be a large attendance, as these services are always most impressive and interesting.

Archbishop's Consecration.
As announced in yesterday's Advertiser, the consecration of Archbishop McEay will take place in St. Michael's Cathedral, Toronto, on Wednesday, June 17. The pontifical high mass will be chanted by the papal delegate, Mgr. Sbarretti. Bishop Dowling, of Hamilton, will perform the ceremony of consecration. After the masses have been said, addresses will be read to his grace, on behalf of the clergy, by separate schools and children of the schools of the archdiocese. It is expected that all the archbishops and bishops of Canada will attend. Several noted churchmen from the United States will also be in attendance. There will be over two hundred priests present.

The Death of Mrs. Jane Dyer.
Mrs. Jane Dyer, widow of the late Mark Dyer, died at Strathroy today in the 90th year of her age. Mrs. Dyer was born at Drougheda, in Ireland, in 1819, and came to Canada in 1874, with her father and family. She lived at Niagara for seven years, and knew the late William Lyon Mackenzie. Her father, the late William Fulton, came to Katesville, in this country, in the year 1844. She was married to Mr. Mark Dyer, and lived in the Gore of London Township for over 40 years. After her husband's death she removed to Strathroy to live with her sister, and died there. She was one of the oldest residents of the county. The funeral will take place from the G. T. R. station on Saturday, on the arrival of the Strathroy train at 1 o'clock. The interment will take place at the Gore Cemetery.

COLLEGIATE CADETS IN SPLENDID SHAPE

Highly Complimented By Col. McDougall at the Annual Inspection.

The annual inspection of the London Collegiate Cadet Corps took place at the barracks Thursday afternoon at 3:30.

Col. McDougall, commanding No. 1 regimental depot, N. C. Co., inspected the corps.

Capt. Jack Greer put the boys through the company, arm and extended order drill, the latter being worked by signals.

Col. McDougall, after the inspection, addressed the boys, and expressed his satisfaction on their very creditable work.

He especially complimented them on their drill, which, he said, was the best he had ever seen a cadet corps do. In fact, he said that the boys worked like regular soldiers.

He also complimented Capt. Greer on the able manner in which he handled his company during the drill.

The present state of the corps is a credit to Capt. Gregory, the drill instructor. After the inspection the boys were marched to a local confectionery, where they partook of some light refreshment provided by the officers of the corps, Capt. Greer, Lieuts. McBride and Tennant. This brought to a close the most successful year the cadet corps has yet had.

JAS. F. CREIGHTON IS RECOVERING

Sequel To Owen Sound Tragedy—Coroner's Jury Brings In Verdict of Murder.

Owen Sound, May 28.—The verdict of the coroner's jury in the case of James F. Creighton, who killed his wife and two stepdaughters on Tuesday, was "Murder." The decision reached was unanimous, and was not qualified by any statement as to the supposed mental condition of the prisoner.

The jury were out about two hours, and the witnesses examined were Dr. J. G. Hershey, Dr. W. G. Dow, Wm. Hughes, D. A. Christie and Geo. P. Creighton.

Mr. H. G. Tucker acted as counsel for the prisoner, and urged that the jury bring in a verdict of temporary insanity as the cause of the killing.

Creighton had manifested himself in several of Creighton's relatives, and that the circumstances surrounding the tragedy plainly indicated that it was not the action of a sane man.

Creighton, the prisoner, is making rapid progress toward recovery at the General and Marine Hospital. He is sleeping soundly tonight, and is regaining strength hour by hour.

On recovery Creighton will be removed from the hospital to the jail. His ward in the hospital is under police surveillance day and night, special constables assisting the police in guarding him.

The bodies of Mrs. Creighton and her two stepdaughters were sent to Ypsilanti, Mich., via London and Port Huron this morning. A large crowd was at the depot when the three hearses bearing the remains arrived from the undertaking rooms, but the caskets were placed in the cases and carried to the baggage car, the bereaved friends found themselves alone on the platform.

In this paper is told the pathetic incident of the dying general's signing of the letter which asked of some future president the appointment of Grant's grandson, Ulysses third, to West Point. The document itself, which is reproduced in the article, bears the autograph indorsements of General Sherman and President McKinley.
