For Allies' Loan

New York, Oct. 1—Members of the big syndicate, which will manage the \$500,000,000 bond issue, negotiated by the Anglo-French loan commission, had received today a flood of applications from banks and individuals for permission to participate.

New Orleans, Sept. 30—Nineteen known dead probably 200 injured and damage to buildings, wire circuits, railroads, shipping and other property in New Orleans and vicinity, estimated at several million dollars was the toll enacted by a hurricane which swept the city on Wednesday, the worst ever experienced in this city.
