OPEN VERDICT IS RETURNED BY JURY

Lineman's Death Ascribed
to Electrocutation and Fall
From Pole.

The inquiry into the death of Palmer Goddard, a N. B. Telephone Company lineman, who was electrocuted while working on a pole in West St. John on Monday last night, was concluded last night in the Court House, Grand street, before Coroner A. F. Emery and jury.

Only one witness, Dr. H. L. Abramson, gave evidence last night, and after a deliberation of 40 minutes the jury returned the following verdict: "Palmer Goddard died on Sept. 18, 1924, in the parish of Lunenburg, while working on the installation of a telephone to a house he came in contact with a live wire, causing electrocution and a fall causing his death."

The jury members were as follows: E. J. Todd (foreman), F. C. Dineen, William Wheaton, Wilfred Darragh, T. X. Gibbon, W. V. Hatfield, John Hughes. Dr. Abramson testified that he examined the body on the day of the burial and found a deep burn on the right forearm through the tissues. The arm was charred and burned to the bone. On the left hand palm surface was another burn. The skull was fractured on the right side.

When asked as to the cause of death, witness said that from his examination of the burns there was evidence that the current had passed through the body and the probability was that the man was electrocuted. This conclusion, the witness said, was reached from the outer appearance on the body as he had not made an autopsy. If there was life in the man when he fell to the ground, witness said, the fracture of the skull would have been sufficient to have caused his death.

In addressing the jury Coroner Emery said that there had been nothing brought out regarding any law not permitting a telephone and an electric line to be placed on the one pole.

EDUCATION TO SAVE EYESIGHT

Conservation Council of America Carries Campaign
Into New England.

Burlington, Vt., Sept. 25.—The educational campaign of the Eyesight Conservation Council of America has reached Vermont this week with Charles F. Southard of New York, field secretary, delivering a series of addresses to teachers and pupils in the public schools of several cities. These addresses are intended to set forth the great losses which education and industry are said to suffer through neglect of the eyes of pupils and workers.

Former Governor James Martin of Vermont, successor to Secretary of Commerce Hoover as president of the American Engineering Council, in a statement explaining the necessity for extending the work to New England says: "Eye conservation in its social, economic and moral aspects is rapidly becoming a national problem of first importance. Under the leadership of Herbert Hoover, the American Engineering Council undertook as one of a group of post-war activities in the public service the investigation of industrial waste. Significant findings were made by the investigators in the field of eye conservation, in which they worked in co-operation with the Eyesight Conservation Council. Industrial accidents, inferior workmanship, restricted output and impaired health were some of the consequences attributed to defective vision."

"Safety programmes, including the adoption of codes, have been set in motion by industry, and paralleling this effort systematic eye conservation work is under way in schools and colleges."

TRAIN SERVICE ST. JOHN-HALIFAX

New Schedules in Effect Sept. 28th
Of Interest To Travellers.

Changes of time schedules effective Sept. 28th on Canadian National Lines affect some of the services in and out of the St. John Station and travellers will do well to note the same. No. 9 and No. 10 between Halifax and St. John will be discontinued. There will be ample service between St. John and Halifax, however. Passengers leaving St. John by the morning local at 7:05 a.m. will connect at Moncton with the Maritime Express, leaving Moncton at 10:40 a.m. and arriving in Halifax at 5:25 p.m. Passengers leaving St. John by No. 14 train at 1:25 p.m. will connect with the Ocean Limited at Moncton and arrive in Halifax at 11:10 p.m.

There is a new night service. Passengers will leave by No. 20 at 6:15 p.m. and this train will run through to Truro. A sleeping car for Halifax will be carried, and this car will be transferred at Truro to train No. 8 leaving Truro at 6:00 a.m. and arriving in Halifax at 8:45 a.m. As No. 8 does not leave Sydney on Saturday, this sleeping car service from St. John will be daily except Saturday and Sunday.

The day service from Halifax to St. John will be as usual by Ocean Limited leaving Halifax at 8:00 a.m. connecting with No. 13 train at Moncton and arriving in St. John at 8:40 p.m. The night service will be by No. 1 Maritime Express leaving Halifax at 8:40 p.m. A through sleeper for St. John will be attached, and this will be transferred at Moncton to train No. 41 leaving Moncton at 11:30 p.m. (except Sunday) and arriving in St. John at 5:50 a.m. (except Mondays). Passengers in Sleeper car occupy berths until 8:00 a.m.

Suburban trains for Hampton will leave St. John at 12:20 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. No. 24, the Sussex train, will leave at 6:15 p.m. as usual. No. 29 leaving at 6:15 p.m. will do the suburban work as far as Hampton. Suburban trains will leave Hampton for St. John at 6:40 a.m. and 1:45 p.m. No. 23 will leave Sussex for St. John at 6:40 a.m. arriving at 8:45 a.m. Train No. 48 from Moncton will arrive at usual at 9:00 p.m. Suburban trains Nos. 134 and 135 are cancelled.

On the Valley Railway No. 45 passenger train will run to Fredericton on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, leaving at 4:20 p.m. (Atlantic Time) arriving in Fredericton at 7:40 p.m. and mixed train No. 241 will leave St. John at 7:30 a.m. (Atlantic Time) on the same days arriving in Fredericton at 1:20 p.m. The passenger train for Centerville No. 47 will leave Fredericton daily except Sunday at 5:50 p.m. and arrive St. John at 1:20 p.m. (Atlantic Time). Train No. 242 will leave Fredericton at 6:45 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays arriving in St. John at 11:45 a.m.

It should be noted that there will be no connection via the Valley route for Edmundston and Quebec. These connections can be more conveniently made via Moncton by trains Nos. 14 and 13 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

The P. E. Island connections will be made as usual by train No. 44 leaving at 7:05 a.m. and by No. 14 leaving at 1:25 p.m. Connections will be made at Sackville with train for Timonville. The Cafe car on No. 14 will only go as far as Moncton and will return to St. John on the evening train No. 43.

VISITORS ARE GIVEN FAREWELL

Rev. Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Tedford last night gave farewell addresses in the Tabernacle Baptist church, of which Mr. Tedford's brother, Rev. A. L. Tedford, is pastor. Mr. and Mrs. Tedford have spent the last twenty months on furlough in Canada and are sailing from Quebec next week to return to India, where Mr. Tedford will take up his duties as one of the lecturers in the theological seminary at Ramapatnam, where there are about 150 students in training.

Mr. and Mrs. Tedford left this morning for Windsor, Carlton county, N.B., to say good-bye to relatives and will leave Windsor on Tuesday for Quebec from which they will sail on Thursday. They will leave their children, two sons, in Canada.

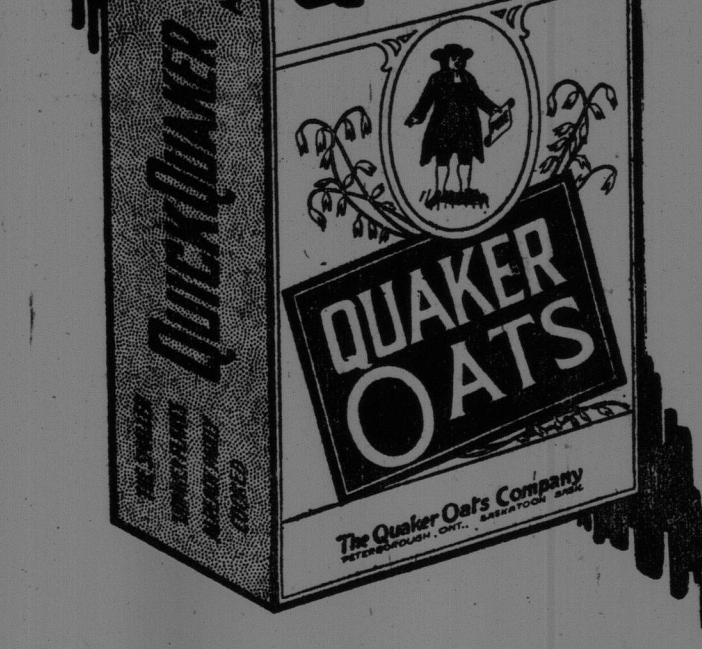
