CANADIANS COME BACK FROM STATES

They Returned to The Number of 27,486 in Six Months.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—(By Canadian Press)—The number of 27,486 returned to Canada from the United States during the first half of the present fiscal year, according to immigration department figures.

The statement of the department shows a falling off of ten per cent. in immigration from Great Britain to Canada during the first half of the present fiscal year, as compared with the same period a year ago.

During the first half of the fiscal year 1924, total immigration was 94,868, divided as follows: British, 10,165, and from other countries, 84,703.

MARX GOVERNMENT GOES TO COUNTRY
