FIRST ON TRACKS; THEN IN THE AIR

London, May 15.—Plans for an aerial pullman are being examined by British aircraft authorities. A great slim metal saloon, like a long tapering pullman car, is the basis of the idea. Covered with smooth gleaming sheets of a featherweight metal alloy, this great air coach will be designed to rest on a long framework which will have wheels like a railway coach. The conveyance, which will have day and night accommodation, will run on ordinary railway tracks and will be backed into a railway station to receive its passengers. When they are aboard an engine will take it to an airfield outside a city, where it will be brought to a halt in the centre of a strange intricate framework of widespread wings and machinery. The coach, shedding its railway wheels, will then slide into position above a powerful pneumatic tired airplane chassis, to which it will be bolted. Thus in a few minutes a railway car will be transformed into an airplane.

PRESERVE FORESTS SIR LOMER URGES

Minister of Justice Calls for Co-operation Against a National Menace.

Sir Lomer Gouin has issued the following statement regarding conservation of forests:
"One of the greatest menaces facing Canada today is the progressive destruction of the forest resources. Expert information shows that ten trees have been wasted by human-set fires to one tree utilized for the service of the Canadian people. This spoliation of what is, in the main, a public-owned property, of great immediate utility and quite indispensable to the future of our country, cannot be permitted to proceed much longer. If we are willing to recognize the damaging consequences of forest waste, surely we are willing, as co-partners in Canada's progress, to put a stop right now to a form of public robbery that must be checked if the nation is to survive."
"The forest is the most destructible of all our natural resources. Had it not been for recurrent conflagrations started by human carelessness, Canada today would undoubtedly have been the richest forest owner on the globe. Forest scarcity has bred high prices and keen demand, so that every square mile of timber in this Dominion may be said to represent potential employment, municipal development, traffic for our railways, home markets for our farmers, and other valuable commercial gains. It is useless to argue that forests are private property, for 85 per cent. of the forest area of Canada is owned by the people. Even where forest protection nothing more than insurance on the existence of paper and lumber companies and the newspaper industry, the claim on a Canadian citizen's co-operation would be hardly less sensible."
"One of the sturdiest pillars of public revenue, railway traffic, well-paid employment, and the upkeep of hundreds of municipalities is standing timber. That pillar may continue to make a great statistical showing right to the edge of national disaster, for the manufacture of forest products can proceed at high speed until the moment that the storehouse of raw materials reaches the brink of bankruptcy. If we are to avoid such disaster we must join hands as citizens today and stop the plague of camper's fires, and the multitude of other vicious agencies that we Canadians with our own hands are setting loose each summer to ruin a great public heritage."

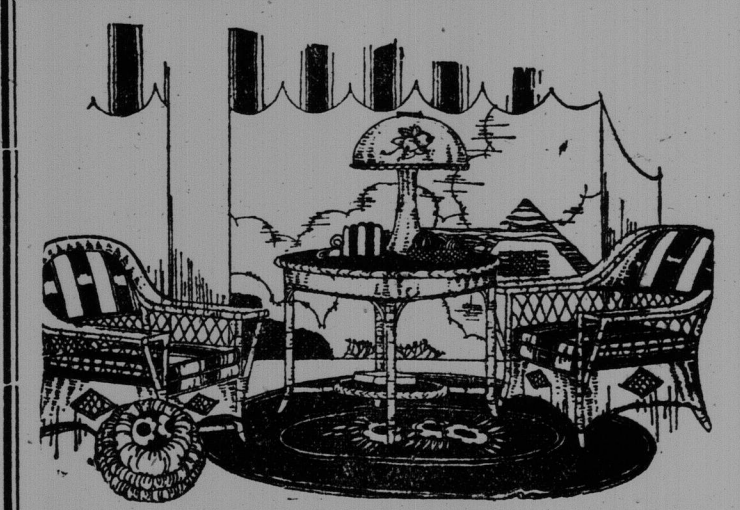

Male Membership In Y. W. C. A. Proposed

Mrs. W. H. Lugsdin presided over a well attended meeting of the Y. W. C. A. board of directors yesterday afternoon and Mrs. George W. Parker led the devotional exercises. Very good reports of the last month were read. The residence and cafeteria report showed that Miss Louise Parks had been in charge in place of Miss Baird, who was sick. The members were glad to learn that Miss Baird was recovering. The report of the Travellers' Aid showed that 166 trains and twenty-three boats had been met, 117 persons taken to the Home, 107 assisted and employment found for two.

Physical Committee.
The physical committee report told of much energetic work for the coming gymnasium display, both in the strenuous practice by the pupils and in the faithful work of the sewing committee under Mrs. A. E. Logie's convenerhip. The gymnasium members had enjoyed hikes, parties at the recreation centre and basketball matches and the month had been filled with many activities.
The finances of the Y. W. C. A. were still a serious consideration. The men's committee reported that it would carry on until it had reached its objective of \$10,000 and was able to hand over that amount to the Y. W. C. A. association. The recent rummage sale had realized \$100.
The recommendation of the men's committee that men should be enrolled as sustaining members, paying an annual fee of \$10 and that memberships be renewed in future, instead of campaigns for large amounts was well received.
The girls' work report told of the meetings of the Loyalty Club, which also had much enjoyed entertainment as the guests of the general secretary at the King street residence. The Loyalty Club members had assisted in making the costumes for the gymnasium display. The Bosters, in senior and junior divisions, had had successful meetings. The grand concert had realized \$34.50, more than enough to make all of the thirty-three members of the senior branch, members of the Y. W. C. A., a gratifying achievement. A hike to Lily Lake was a much enjoyed treat. The children from the West St. John orphanage had attended gymnasium classes on Saturday and had benefited greatly. These classes, however, would have to be discontinued to resume again in the fall. The Girl Guides had held regular meetings.
Physical Director Resigns.
Miss G. K. Pepler's resignation as physical director was respectfully accepted and it was arranged to communicate with possible successors, Miss Pepler's work was greatly praised.
For summer plans it was announced that the use of the Y. M. C. A. swimming tank could be secured if there was any instructress available. Mrs. Burnham had offered the use of her cottages at Bedford for the month of June and part of July. It was thought that the offer might be accepted and the cottages used as a Y. W. C. A. summer camp for business girls during June and for high school girls in the two weeks in July, if this could be arranged.
The possibility of a maritime conference of Y. W. C. Associations at Wallace, N. S., was spoken of, and the meeting considered this conference a very desirable undertaking. It was decided that the St. John Association should be represented at the conference if it is held.
Two gifts were gratefully acknowledged. The Royal Standard chapter, I. O. O. E., sent \$25 and the Loyalty chapter \$50. The contributions were very welcome.
Arrangements for the annual meeting were completed and Mrs. Perival Foster, the general secretary, told of having attended special gatherings. A letter from Miss Dugan, the Y. W. C. A. missionary in Foo Chang, China, read at yesterday's meeting told of a very distressing economic and social conditions among the people of that district where the cotton mill workers had twelve-hour shifts and only two days off duty each month, their pay being a very meagre sum and not sufficient to give them any of the necessities of life or what are ordinarily considered necessities.

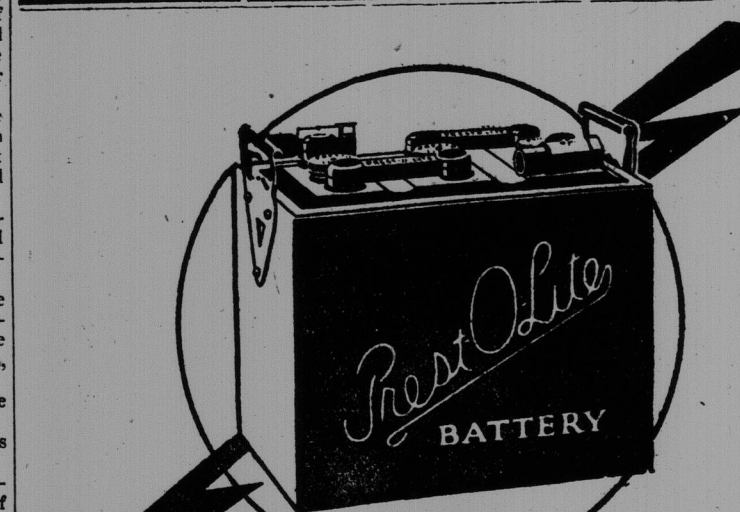
